HALIFAX .- Vital Statistics .- The mortality in the City of Halifax during the months of July, August, and Septemberwas very great, amounting to 328 deaths, of which 188 were males and 140 females.

The average annual mortality is about 750, so that the deaths during three months the average.

infants at or under one year; 202 died before the fifth year was completed. Dysentery and Cholera Infantum caused 102 of the 328 deaths. 44 died from Whooping Cough, and 13 from Convulsions.

During the three months mentioned above, the mortality among infants was not only excessive, but, perhaps, unparalelled in the history of the city, - the number of deaths having exceeded greatly the number of births.

The causes of death in the order of mortality were: - Dysentery, 59; Whooping Cough, 44; Choire Infantum, 43; Phthisic, 38; Old Age, 24; Convulsions, 13;

For the above facts we are indebted to the records in the Statistical Office. Estimating the population of the city at 32,-000 in round numbers, the mortality during the summer months would be equal to one death to each 24 persons living. The usual death rate being from one in 45 to one in 50.

ACCIDENT TO THE " DELTA."-The steamrr Delta, on her outward passage to Bermuda ran on the northern reef of the Island, but was got off and taken into the harbor. She was so much damaged however, that it was found necessary to transship the portion of the cargo intended for. St. Thomas into the schr Meteor, for conveyance to that port. The Delta will have to undergo repairs at Bermuda.

HALIFAX BANK .- The first meeting of the Haliax Banking Company since its incorporation by Act of the Legislature, under the name of the " Halifax Bank," was held in Argyle Hall, on Tuesday. The following gentlemen were elected Directors : B. H. Collins, William Pryor, P. C. Hill, W. Harrington, John Stairs, Thomas Bayne and Robie Uniacke. W. Pryor, Esq., was elected President.

ANTIGONISH AND SYDNEY-The Eastern Chronicle reports that arrangements have been made by a local company with parties in New York, for placing an efficient steamer on the route between Antigonish and Sydney, C.B., via St. Peters' Canal. The Company was incorporated by Act of our Local Legislature last winter. Its capital is \$40,000 in 400 shares of \$100 each. Nearly all the Stock has been subscribed in Halifax, New Glasgow, Antigonish and Sydney. The steamer is to be 116 feet long, 25 feet wide, with ample accomodation for 60 first class and 25 second class passengers, and is to cost \$37,000.
