ORDINATION AT NORTH RIVER, P. E. I.

Delegates invited from sister churches by the North River Baptist Church to confer with them in Council as to the propriety of ordaining Bro. W. B. Bradshaw, A. B., to the work of the christian ministry, and the pastorate of that church, met at North River on Thursday, 4th inst., at 10 A. M. After singing and prayer, the Council was organized by the choice of Rev. John Davis for President, and Bro. J. A. Durkee for Clerk. North River Church was represented by deacons Jas. Warren, and Alex. Mackinlay, and Bros. Donald Scott, Allan Mackinlay, Geo. Warren, Peter Warren, Wm. Cummings, Danl. Mackinlay, John McPhee and John Mackinlay. Durkee, Licentiate. Uigg,—Bro. Donald McDonald, (Lic.) East Point,—Bros. Duncan Robertson; Jas. DeWolfe, Licentiate, of Pereau Church, Cornwallis, N. S., was on motion invited to a seat with the Council. Bro. Bradshaw was then examined as to his Christian experience, call to the ministry and his views of Christian doctrine, church order &c., with satisfactory results. Bros. Alex. MacKinlay and Jas. Warren stated that the church inviting the council had full confidence in the christian character and the qualifications of the candidate and had called him to the pastorate and provided satisfactorily for his support. It was therefore unanimously resolved, that the Council concur with the action of the Church and advise his ordination.

It was further resolved, that the matter of arranging for the ordination be left with the ministerial members of the Council. Arrangements were accordingly made and the Council adjourned to meet at 3 P. M. Davis; Charge to the Candidate, Rev. Malcolm Ross; Right hand of fellowship, Rev. Fred. Kidston; Charge to the Church, Rev. J. Davis; Closing prayer and Benediction, Rev. W. B. Bradshaw.

Dominion & Foreign News.

HALIFAX, N. S., JULY 10, 1872.

The Electioneering Campaign for the Dominion Parliament has commenced. A meeting of the opponents of Sir John A. McDonald's government was held on Friday last when Alfred G. Jones and Patrick Power Esquires, were unanimously nominated.

ANOTHER SEIZURE.—Quebec papers report that the American schooner James Bliss, of Gloucester, seized by a Canadian police vessel for illegal fishing, arrived there last week. The James Bliss, when captured, was about a mile from the shore, between the east end of Anticosti Island and Cormorant Point, with five trawls set. She had two thousand pounds of halibut on board and a crew of twelve men.

THE MONTREAL DEATH HARVEST.—The Montreal Daily News says—"We can hardly bring ourselves to believe that the mortality returns for the last week are correct, they exhibit such a fearful rate of mortality. How the authorities can remain inactive in the face of such reports from the cemeteries we cannot conceive. We are told that 165 interments took place last week, and we know that our population does not exceed 120,000. Let us realize what these figures mean. The normal death rate in Montreal in former days was but 20 to 22. It now rises into the seventies. Very recently one report gave 120 in the week, which was equivalent to 52 per 1,000, of the population of 120,000; but 165 interments means a death rate not far short of 7 1/4 per 1,000 of the population, while in Great Britain the returns from nineteen of the largest cities was the first week of June, only 21 per 1,000 of the population. Our mission is to chronicle facts and present them to our readers; their's is to force the authorities to adopt immediate steps to ascertain the cause of the frightful mortality, and provide remedies to save the lives of the citizens."

Lord Dufferin has arrived at Ottawa and entered upon his duties as Governor General of the Dominion. He is a man of very high character and reputation. Rev. S. Houston stated on Thursday in Synod that when the Regium Donum was withdrawn from the Irish Presbyterian Church, Lord Dufferin made a permanent provision of equal value for all the ministers on his estates. He also rendered valuable service to the Presbyterian Mission in Syria after the massacre of 1860. He is a good speaker, a fascinating writer and a man well acquainted with public affairs. He will probably be still more popular as Governor General than his able and accomplished predecessors, Lords Monck and Lisgar.—Witness.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

DEATH OF HON. MR. HATHAWAY.—On Friday last, intelligence was received of the death of the Hon. George L. Hathaway, Prov. Secretary of New Brunswick, after a distressing illness of several days, caused by a shock and injuries received in jumping from a railway car, near Fredericton, while the train was in motion. Deceased had for several years occupied a seat in the New Brunswick House of Assembly as one of the representatives of York county and was the leader of the present government.

FATAL ENCOUNTER.—At Nashua; York Co., on Wednesday last, as Deputy Sheriff Seely was attempting to seize, by legal process, some property belonging to Harding Clayton, he was fired at by the latter three times with a revolver. Seely then drew his pistol and shot Clayton in the throat, causing his death almost immediately. Clayton was a man of violent temper and extremely troublesome nature. He was a married man, but had separated from his wife some time ago.

ANOTHER MYSTERY.—A few days since the dead body of a man in a state of decomposition was found in the woods at St. Croix. Not far from the spot a pedlar's knapsack was also discovered. The question is, how came he by his death? A coroner's inquest pronounced it "Accidental Death by drowning."

UNITED STATES.

Thirty nine barefooted Friars and seven Dominican Friars banished from Guatemala, for conspiracy against Government, arrived in San Francisco on Tuesday the 2nd inst. The thermometer had ranged from 100 to 103 for two or three days.

The fourth of July was observed with undiminished demonstrations of joy on Thursday-last. The intense heat of the past week produced a very large number of cases of sunstroke, it was said 200 on the 3rd inst, many of which—60 in New York—had proved fatal.

It is reported that the Emperor William is to give a decision favorable to the United States in the matter of San Juan.

The new Erie management has instituted an action for 10,000,000 damages against Jay Gould. Direction claims it can prove that he has appropriated legitimate earnings of the road to his own use.

Dan Godfrey's coolness in the Coliseum on the fourth inst., in breaking from "Zimpa" into the "Star Spangled Banner," on the cry of "fire," and thereby stopping a regular stampede, is everywhere extolled.

The Academy of Music was crowded on Friday night by persons to hear the British Grenadier Guards' Band. They were repeatedly encored. "God Save the Queen" and the "Star Spangled Banner" were received with the wildest enthusiasm. The Band sailed on Saturday morning for Liverpool. Dense crowds filled the wharves, and the Band were the recipients of hearty cheers as the steam-ship moved off.

New York, July 8.—The Grenadier Guards Band sailed from New York on Saturday, after an enthusiastic reception and excellent concert here. Property of the New York Central Railroad, to the value of \$23,000, was burned in West Albany on Saturday night. The deaths of last week in Philadelphia were 764, an increase of 350—one-half being children under one year old. There is little doubt but Greeley will be nominated unanimously on the first ballot. A telegram from General Sickles received at the Department of State says an order has been given to discharge Dr. Howard and restore his property. Stokes was on the stand to-day and swore that Fisk drew a pistol on him first, and he shot him in self-defence.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—A London despatch of last Wednesday evening says the official correspondence which has passed between the British Government and Lord Tenterden, its agent before the Geneva Tribunal, is published. It comprises twelve despatches besides the protocols of the proceedings before the Board, which have already been made known to the public. The correspondence closes with a despatch from Earl Granville, expressive of appreciation of the services of Lord Tenterden and Sir Roundell Palmer. Earl Granville says:—"I should not do justice to the feelings of Her Majesty's Government if I did not acknowledge the conciliatory spirit manifested by your American colleague. The good feeling shown on both sides has facilitated the deliberation of the Arbitrators." Earl Granville, in conclusion, acknowledges, "the thoughtfulness and wisdom evinced by the Arbitrators in adopting the conclusions to which they spontaneously arrived."

The Fourth of July was duly observed in London, Liverpool, and on the continent by American travellers and residents.

A telegram from Paris asserts a threatening conspiracy of Royalists, under Lucide Broglie, for the overthrow of the Republic recently discovered. Thiers took energetic action for its suppression, and it is believed a dangerous movement is defeated. The International Prison Reform Congress met in London last night. Every civilized country in the world was represented.

Ship Omaha, from Liverpool for Calcutta, was wrecked at Sangur Island, in Hoogley River. Seven of the crew were drowned. Screw steamship Lapeing running between Liverpool and Rotterdam, collided with an unknown vessel off Isle of Wight on Tuesday night last. It is believed that twenty-one persons perished.

The weather in England has been fair and favorable to crops.

It is stated that Bismark has received assurance from three of the great Catholic powers, consenting to a conclave of Cardinals, in order to have a perfect understanding between Cardinals and Governments interested in the Pope.

England, Italy and Switzerland decline accepting the modifications proposed to treaty of commerce by France.

FRANCE.—President Thiers, in an address to the members of the "Left" in the French Assembly, who are unanimous in their support of him, told them that on no account would he resign, and expressed himself as determined to firmly defend all the interests of the Republic.

Paris, July 1.—In the Assembly this afternoon M. Pausat read the treaty for the evacuation of France. There was a great disappointment when it was found that although certain districts are to be gradually evacuated, Germany has the right to maintain full strength of the army of occupation of France till war indemnity is entirely liquidated. The minister of Finance did not submit at to-day's session his bill for raising a new loan. The specie in Bank of France increased three million francs during the past week. The Assembly on Saturday, with only four dissenting votes, ratified the treaty for the evacuation of French territory by German troops. The Right persists in denying any credit to Thiers for the conclusion of treaty. The loan question comes up in the Assembly to-day.

It is reported that Victor Hugo has succeeded in securing change of sentence passed upon Rochefort, and that he will be simply banished from France. SPAIN.—The King of Spain is about to take an extensive trip through the Provinces, lately the prey of Carlist agitations. The Spanish republicans have resolved to abstain from all elections of a monarchical character. The Spanish Government have sent large reinforcements to Catalonia to suppress the disloyal demonstrations.

A band of insurrectionists, under Cabriella, made attempt yesterday to enter the town of Rens, in Province Tarragona, but were repulsed. Cabriella wounded and taken prisoner.

Archbishop of Madrid is dead. The Republicans have reversed their former decision, and are now determined upon taking part in the forth-coming Elections.

The Spanish Government have appointed Perez Riva political Governor of Havana.

TURKEY.—In Constantinople a conflagration was raging on the 4th Inst. One thousand houses in poorer quarters and suburbs of Scutari are destroyed. There were then no indications that fire was under control.
