Dominion & Foreign News.

HALIFAX, N. S., NOV. 6, 1872.

The steamer " Livarno," from Sicily, has arrived at Montreal. It is the first Italian steamer that has ever visited that port.

The snows fell heavily on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway on Monday night between Richmond and Point Levis.

Three of the children of Lord and Lady Duffernin-Lord Grandebove, Lady Helen Blackwood, and the Honorable Terence Temple Blackwood-arrived in the "Prus sian," at Quebce last week, and went directly to Ottawa to meet their parents.

UNITED STATES.

The horse disease is abating in New York and Boston. It is spreading in Pennsylvania, and Maryland, and Ohio. In New York city the disease had in many cases proved fatal.

The wife of Horace Greeley died on Wednesday last.

The steamship Missouri, Captain Curtis, which left New York Oct. 17th for Havana and Nassau, was burned off Abaco on the 22nd. Over eighty lives were lost. The news was received by steamer Anna, just arrived at Key West from Nassau. Only twelve persons are known to be saved. The Missouri had 34 passengers, and crew of 58 men. The fire was discovered about 9 a. m., in the pantry, and suddenly burst in volumes of flame amidships, spreading rapidly over the ship. The boats were launched immediately, and all but one swamped at once. Those who remained on board the burning vessel were compelled on account of the flames, to jump into the sea. Those saved landed in one of the boats on Abaco at 6 p. m., on the evening of the 22nd, and were taken from there in a small schooner to Nassau. The catastrophe occurred during a heavy gale.

The steamer "Victor," from New York for New Orleans, broke her shaft and drove ashore at Juriter Inlet, Oct. 21st. The crew were saved, but she is broken up. Loss \$25,000.

Marauders from Texas have raided into Mexico, and are burning the dwellings. Some Americans were killed in a melee. The United States authorities will pursue and punish the marmauders.

A new expedition to Cuba has been organized. It is said to comprise 2500 men and 500 arms.

The trial of Mayor Hall, for official corruption, resulted in disagreement of the jury. Seven were for conviction and six for acquittal.

Cuba .- Information has been received direct from Puerto Plata that a successful landing had been made on the Cuban coast of a small quantity of arms, and a good supply of powder and lead; expedition sailed from that port.

R. A. Lesile, manager of the Bank of B. N. America, and his accountant, Mr. Me-Donald, were drowned at New York by the upsetting of a boat on Saturday. Both bodies were recovered.
