

brooke will be appointed to that post and that the Marquis of Lansdowne will probably succeed Lord Northbrooke as under Secretary of State for War, should he be made Viceroy.

The marriage of the Marquis of Bute to the daughter of Lord Edward George Howard is announced to take place soon. Five hundred weight of gunpowder was seized in Cork yesterday.

The yacht "Enchantress" will be sent by the Admiralty to Suva to receive the remains of the Earl of Mayo, and convey them to England.

Sir Charles Dilke addressed his constituents at Chelsea last week. The meeting was crowded, and slightly disorderly at the opening, but a large police force kept order. Sir H. Hoar replied, defending the Crown.

In answer to a question of Mr. Disraeli, when the Government had received the American case of the Alabama claims, Mr. Gladstone replied that it would be inconvenient for the Government to answer the enquiry at present.

Evening gatherings of Legitimists are increasing daily in London and becoming formidable. It is confined to no nationality, although French preponderate in numbers. The German and Spanish Legitimists are well represented. The ex-King of Hanover arrived yesterday with a large party of supporters. The leading Ultramontanists from Italy, Germany, and France are also flocking to the city. It is rumored that all are acting together harmoniously, and they are deliberating over plans for the restoration of all deposed Sovereigns.

The Fifth and River Tay overflowed their banks on Saturday, washing away the railroad between Perth and Dundee, doing great damage to warehouses and other buildings in Dundee.

After the Thanksgiving ceremonies at St. Paul's, the Prince of Wales will go on a tour to the Italian Lakes, staying abroad two months.

FRANCE.—Another Bonapartist conspiracy is said to be discovered, their object being to disperse the Assembly by force, and take possession of the Government—in consequence the Belgian frontier is carefully guarded.

The manifesto of Monarchists in the French Assembly was taken to Antwerp yesterday by Count Monte, and presented to Chambord.

Bishop Dupanloup, Dukes Rohan and Treuille had arrived at Antwerp on Friday last.

SPAIN.—It is said that King Amadeus has become disgusted and wishes to abdicate the throne of Spain.

ITALY.—The Pope pre-canonized 28 Bishops on Thursday last including 4 for America.

It was reported on Sunday week that the Pope had convoked the Ecumenical Council, to meet at Malta or Tyrol, and that His Holiness would then leave Rome.

GERMANY.—Germany is said to be arming. Two corps are ordered to be in readiness. The cause for these preparations is the great activity of political parties at Versailles, and the possibility of a change in the Government of France.

Prince Bismarck proposes to issue invitations to the Powers for an International Congress, the object of which will be to establish a system of cheap and uniform rates of postage, and to facilitate the transmission and exchange of mails.

Emperor William of Germany is suffering from indigestion. The Queen Dowager Elizabeth, now in her 71st year, is also ill. Fears of serious results are entertained. By latest accounts the Emperor had rallied sufficiently to do business.
