

ABSTRACT OF ESTIMATED EXPENDITURE.

Wednesday next was appointed the day for going into Committee of Supply; after remarks from several members in reference to some of the items.

The House in Committee on Bills passed the following:—Relating to Normal School lands at Truro. Relating to the appointment of Trustees of land granted for religious purposes; To regulate the payment of Grand Jurors; To amend Chapter 72 of the Revised Statutes of Commissioners of Sewers and for the regulation of dyked lands; and a bill respecting Private Railways.

A bill relating to Law Students was referred back to the Committee on Law Amendments.

MONDAY, 25th.—A number of Bills were read a third time, agreed to, and sent to the Legislative Council.

The Attorney General laid on the table the papers relating to the *nolle prosequi* in the suit of the Government vs. Morrisey.

In reply to a question submitted by Mr. Holmes, the Provincial Secretary said that the subject of Railway Extension was under consideration of the Government.

Hon. Provincial Secretary said it was not the intention of the Government to introduce any amendment of the Education Act but he would place before the House a copy of an Act which had been prepared, having for its object the establishment of a Provincial University, for which he would bespeak careful consideration.
