The Provincial Secretary stated that the delegates who went to Washington respecting trade facilities, had made no report.

The Hon. James McDonald asked the Provincial Secretary to lay before the Com mittee on Public Accounts certain books in the office of Treasurer, in order to enable the Committee to arrive at a correct understanding of all the accounts in connection with the payment of \$6,710 94, as well as of other sums of the public money. The Secretary declined to submit the books asked for, but said if Mr. McDonald would call at his office he could see there all the books and papers.

Mr. Woodworth supported the application of Mr. McDonald, and moved that the House require the Government to submit the books to the Committee, but upon the Attorney General promising that every facility should be afforded the Committee to obtain the information sought the resolution was withdrawn.
