

LIVERPOOL.—A barn owned by Dr. H. G. Farish, and a building adjoining owned by Mr. Harrington, were destroyed by fire on Tuesday morning. After the fire Dr. Farish entertained the two fire companies at his residence, and presented \$20 to each.

OUR EXPORTS.—The Atlantic Cable Company's steamship *Robt. Lowe* cleared last week for London. Among her freight she takes 648 cases of canned lobsters, and 3500 boxes of smoked herrings.

ACCIDENT.—John Booth, laborer, employee at Hornsby's brickyard, Eastern Passage, had his right arm crushed in the machinery a day or two ago so that he had to have it amputated.

The St. John Tribune reports that the Hon. Dr. Tupper's eldest son lately met with a severe injury by falling off the wharf at Cacouna.

BAY Verte CANAL.—At the first meeting of the Privy Council of Canada since the elections, which was held on Friday last, the report of Mr. Keefer C. E., which has been before the Board of Works, was confirmed by the Council. Mr. Keefer states that he believes improvements can be made in the route which will place the cost at five to six millions. It is ordered that a party be sent immediately to make the necessary levels to fix the improved route, in order that the work of construction may be put up to tender before the close of the year.—*Amherst Gazette*.

CROPS IN P. E. ISLAND.—Charlottetown papers report that the harvest throughout the island is unusually late, but the yield promises to be quite an average, providing the frost should keep off sufficiently long to allow the great bulk of the grain time to ripen. Oats and Barley will turn out better than many anticipated, and the wheat is not so much damaged by weevil as in some other years. Potatoes look exceedingly well; and the tubers are large and already dry. Turnips also promise to be an average crop.
