GUYSBORO.—Murder by an Insane man. On Friday of last week, at Oyster Ponds, country of Guysboro', an old man named Daniel McDonald, who, for some time, had manifested symptoms of insanity, stabbed an acquaintance, named Matthew Corner, with a clasp knife, inflicting six wounds in his breast from which death resulted almost immediately.

SUPREME COURT.—The prisoners convicted at the present term were sentenced on Monday last as follows:—George Oliver, for breaking into a store at Tangier, and stealing eight kegs of powder—one year in common Jail.

Wm. Medley—for doing serious bodily harm to Samuel Evans—one year in Penitentiary.

Peter McCrory—for perjury—two years in Penitentiary.

Duncan Campbell—for subornation of perjury—four years in penitentiary.

Dennis Shea, for robbery from Mr. Blacks store, six months in the Penitentiary.

Two cases of some interest were before the Court last week. Hagarty against the City of Halifax, for taking away the porch of his house. Verdict given for plaintiff \$500.

And that of Ingfield against Merkel and Harrington for assault in St. George's Church. Verdict for plaintiff \$25.
