For the information of the brethren, or such of them as may not have a copy of the Constitution, as published in the Min utes of 1872, we subjoin the Article which describes its membership :

3. The Convention shall be composed as follows :- 1st. Each of the Baptist Assocations within the limits of the Convention shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention five of its own Members as Delegates to represent it therein. 2nd. Every Church connected with either of the above-named Assocations, and contributing toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its Members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional Delegate for every twenty dollars so contributed, provided that no Church be at liberty to send more than five Delegates. 3rd. Every ordained Baptist Minister connected with one of the above Churches shall be a Member. 4th. Any Member of one of these Churches, who shall contribute five dollars annually, or fifty dollars at one time, towards the objects of the Convention, shall be a Member.
