Dominion & Foreign News.

HALIFAX, N. S., JUNE 19, 1872.

The Ottawa Parliament closed on Friday last. This is the last session of the first Parliament of the Dominion of Canada.

The following appointment appeared in the last " Canada Gazette :"-William McNab, of Wallace, Nova Scotia to be collector in Her Majesty's Customs.

Mr. Alfred Selwyn has proceeded to the Maritime Provinces for the purpose of making special geological explorations.

His Excellency the Governor General, accompanied by Lady Lisgar, Miss Dalton, some of the members of the Cabinet and suite, took their departure from Ottawa on Saturday by the steamer "Queen Vic-

A telegram to the Chronicle says E. M. McDonald intends retiring from parliamentary life, and will shortly be gazetted to the Collectorship of Customs for the port of Halifax.

Lord Dufferin the new Governor General, is expected to arrive about the 25th

Mr. Power's motion to give additional members for Nova Scotia to Halifax, was voted down, 90 to 32.

Harrison's bill to amend the Insolvency laws was dropped on Wednesday last, there not being time to perfect it.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Board of Trustees at St. John, have passed a resolution forbidding corporal punishment in public schools under its control.

Mr. Finley Morrison, Oak Point, Northumberland, shot himself with a gun at his residence. An inquest was held and the verdict given of temporary insanity.

In the Supreme Court at Fredericton last week, Mr. Skinner obtained a rule for a certiorari to squash schools and other assessments in Wickham, Queen's County upon the grounds, amongst others, that the School Act was unconstitutional, in violation of the British North America act, and took away religious rights as they existed under the School Act of 1858. UNITED STATES.

A New York despatch on Saturday last

It is believed in Washington that at a meeting of the Geneva Arbitrators, the Agent of the U. S. Government will accede to the British request for a postponement. with a protest against England's right to withdraw from the Treaty under any consideration whatever.

The striking workmen in New York were on Saturday threatening to sack the Steinway Pianoforte Manufactory. A large police force protects the building.

Boston is taken up with the great Peace Jubilee. The bands from Great Britain attract much attention. Quite a number of other musical celebrities had arrived and the music is now in full blast. The Jubilee opened on Monday last and was pronounced a grand success.

The first concert commenced shortly after 3 o clock. Address were delivered by the Mayor and General Banks.-The opening piece, "Old Handred," was magnificently performed. Few of those present will ever hear such music again in this world. Gilmore, Zerrah, and Strauss were rapturonsly received. Everything passed off in the most satisfactory manner possible. Notwithstanding the vast size of the

building, the solo singers made themselves heardd istinctly at its farthest extremity. Congress adjourned, without date, at nine o clock on Monday evening, after a

violent debate on the addition of the Enforcement Act to the Omnibus Appropriation Bill, which was carried by a strict party vote.

It is asserted that President Grant concedes the failure of the Treaty.

THE NEW TARIFF bill just passed by the United States Congress is in many respects more advantageous to colonial interests than the old one. The most important item probably is in coal, which, as we have before stated, has been reduced from \$1 25 to 75 cents per ton. The duty on potatoes has been reduced from 25 cents to 15 cents per bushel—a change that will be welcomed by our agriculturists. Sole leather is reduced from 35 per cent. to 15 per cent. Call skins, tanned and dressed, are reduced from 30 per cent. to 25 per cent. Upper leather of all kinds is reduced from 25 per cent to 20 per cent. Squared or sided timber is reduced from 20 per cent. to 1 cent per cubic foot. Sawed boards, plank, deals and other lumber of hemlock, whitewood, sycamore and and basswood are reduced from 20 per cent. to \$1 per M feet, board measure, and the same lumber planed is reduced \$1 50 per M feet, and when tongued and grooved to \$2 per M feet. Laths are reduced from 20 per cent. to 15 cents per thousand pieces; shingles from 20 per cent to 35 cents per M; pine clapboards from 20 per cent. to \$2 50 per M; spruce do, from 20 per cent. to \$1 50 per M; and casks, bar rels and sugar boxes from 35 per cent. to 30 per cent.—Chronicle.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.

Despatches from Geneva on Saturday last said :- The following gentlemen, connected with the Board of Arbitration of the Alabama claims, are now here: C. F. Adams, J. C. Bancroft Davis, Caleb Cushing, Wm. M. Evarts, Morrison R. Waite, Charles C. Beaman, Jr., Sir Alexander Cockburn, Lord Tenderden, Sir Roundell Palmer, Count Sclopis, Mr. Stempfli and Baron Itajuba. The American Consul and agent were closeted on Friday with Mr. Adams, discussing their course.

Geneva is gaily decorated with flags. The absolute failure of the arbitration is not apprehended by either side.

The Ballot Bill passed to its second reading in the Lords after a large vote of 86 against 56.

FRANCE.—It is affirmed that the whole French Assembly is disgusted with the arrogance of M. Thiers in relation to the hew Army Bill. All political parties join in condemning him. A Deputy, in session, charged the venerable President with possessing all the arrogance of the first Napo-

Thiers was attacked on Thursday last by the right in the Assembly, who demanded that he dismiss certain Ministers. and carry on his administration more in accordance with views of the majority.

Fifty five persons were killed and a large number wounded by the explosion of the boiler of a Spanish steamship, while lying at the wharf in Marseilles. The steamer and the wharf took fire, and further damage to a considerable amount ensued.

SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.—The new Spanish Cabinet has been formed. The entire militia of the kingdom is to be reorganized. The Cortes is dissolved. Zurilla has refused to accept the premiership.

An extensive fire occurred in Lisbon, Portugal, on Wednesday last.

GERMANY. - A bill is being prepared in the Federal Council, providing for the expulsion of all Jesuits from Germany.
