Dr. Anderson, of Newton, will probably lecture, also Dr. Weston and Dr. Pepper, and perhaps Dr. Murdoch, but the subjects I cannot announce. They will be, I need not say, of the best class of lectures.

News of the Week.

Granville Street Sabbath School held its Annual picnic on McNab's Island on Friday last. The children and friends were conveyed to the delightful locality at 10 o'clock in the morning, and again at 2 past 2 in the afternoon in the steamer Goliath, the aft part of which was provided with an awning and settees, rendering it in many respects more pleasant than the larger Dartmouth Ferry-boats. All parties concerned enjoyed the trip so much that they only regretted that the Island was not at a greater distance. Arrived on the island, swings and other amusements were soon in demand. But the heat was so intense said to be 93 in the shade, so that the shadow of the tall trees seemed to have greater attractions than the open fields, and water was the great necessity. This

Cheers were given for the Captain of the Goliath, for the Queen, and for the Superintendent and the ladies, and all reached their homes at an early hour having pleasant remembrances of a day on McNab's Island.

All entries must be made in writing, and handed in on or before Tuesday, preceding the day of Exhibition.

Building and grounds open only to Committees and Exhibitors until 10 o'clock, after which the public will be admitted to the grounds free, to the Court House on payment of 25 cents—children half-price.

The award of Premiums will be announced at 2 P. M., and Premiums will be paid at the next regular Quarterly Meeting—first Tuesday in November.

THE SIXTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE Y. M. C. ASSOCIATION OF THE LOWER PROVINCES, will be held in Halifax, on Thursday the 5th day of September, and following days:—

The basis of representation from Associations as fixed by the Convention, is three delegates for fifty members and under, and one delegate for every additional fifty members or fraction of that number.

In addition to the usual reports from Associations, the Committee propose for discussion the following subjects:—

5.—Personal consecration to Christ the essential requisite in a Christian worker.
Delegates will be required to bring with them certificates from the Secretary of their Association, attesting their active membership.

Parker to the Colonist we learn that Mr. Sydney Shaw left his home on Saturday evening at five o'clock, and not returning at nine o'clock, his family became uneasy about him, and at 11 o'clock his son and some of the neighbors started in search of him and about 1 o'clock, a. m., Sunday morning they found his charred remains in the burnt brush. Coroner Marsters held an inquest on Sunday morning and the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death by being burned in the bush, and believing, from the evidence, while in a fit.
