

was shot. Slight disturbances occurred in Dublin and several persons were wounded.

Additional troops were ordered to Belfast and several other towns in North of Ireland as disturbances were feared.

The riots in Belfast broke out afresh on Saturday. This continued through Sunday and Monday. Several houses had been wrecked by the mobs, and immense excitement prevailed.

The populace were divided into a hostile Catholic and Protestant mob, and whenever they came in contact there was a fight. The police were obliged to fire on the rioters on both sides, and many of the latter were wounded.

A telegram from Purgan, Ulster County says serious disturbances are in progress there, and the authorities of the town have called upon the military to aid in restoring order.

A telegram from Belfast on Monday evening says that reports are current that the city is about to be placed under martial law.

The right Hon. Russell Gurney and W. H. Smith were to sail on Thursday for America in the steamship Moravian. Mr. Gurney returns to resume his seat in the American British Joint Claim Commission, which meets in Newport next month, and Mr. Smith, the well known news-dealer in London, will make a tour through Canada and the United States.

General Sherman visited the camp at Aldershot on the 11th Inst and had a very pleasant reception.

The crew of the American yacht "Sapho" has been dismissed in consequence of insubordination.

FRANCE.—It is reported that Gen. Von Moltke has gone to Belfort to inspect the new fortifications.

A despatch from Paris denies the report that the Germans are fortifying Belfort, in violation of the Treaty.

By order of German authorities a Jesuit establishment at Issenheim, Alsace, has been closed.

GERMANY.—The Congress of German Naturalists and Physicians, comprising all the prominent Savans of Germany, is in session at Leipzig. They have passed a resolution of thanks to Stanley of the Livingston Expedition, for his successful effort.

At a meeting of the Emperors at Berlin, a proposition will be made for a congress of European Powers to sanction the territorial modifications of France, occupation of Rome, and a revision of the Treaty of Paris.

One of the most extensive cotton factories in Geneva was burned on Sunday evening—loss 10,000,000 francs. Eight hundred operatives are thus thrown out of employment.

The Crown-Princess Victoria of Prussia offers a prize of ten thousand thalers for the best essay on advancing the material prosperity of working-women. The essays may be written in German, French or English.

SPAIN.—A special despatch from Madrid to the "Times" says that Amadeus has not as reported, signed a decree for gradual abolition of slavery in Cuba and Porto Rico. The document signed is simply a code of rules providing for the enforcement of the law passed by the Cortes in 1869, of slaves in Spanish colonies.

A despatch from Madrid says, Don Carlos has returned to Geneva.

ITALY.—The Daily "News" has a special from Florence stating that it is rumored that Cardinal Antonelli has quarrelled with the Pope, and threatened to resign should the latter persevere in his policy of hostility to the Italian Government, and also that Antonelli has requested the clerical journals to refrain from publishing speeches of the Holy Father.

A despatch from Rome says the Jesuit Assembly have been ordered to convene at Rome in order to consider the expediency of changing the name and dress of the Jesuits expelled from Germany, and directing them to re-enter Prussia as members of the other orders allowed to remain there.

MEXICO.—An official despatch from Ma-

zatlan says that Gen. Diaz has decided to accept the amnesty, which act finally closes the rebellion in Mexico.

Rio Janeiro advices of 24th ult., state that negotiations between Brazil and Argentine continue without result. Meanwhile great military preparations are being made.

JAPAN.—Advices from Japan show the Mikado is continuing his visits throughout his own land, accompanied by various parts by eight men of war, and dressed in foreign costume. Korea has sent threatening letters to Japan, offering to fight, and spurring the Japanese demands for tribute. A Japanese Ambassador has been imprisoned in Korea.

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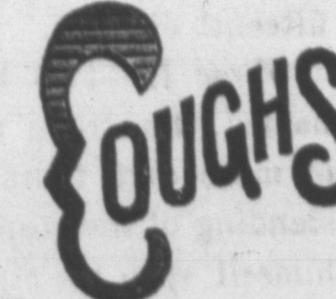
