

ville that there could be no objection on his part. The American counter case would be presented to the Geneva tribunal without prejudice to the rights of either party.

In answer to Disraeli, Mr. Gladstone said that Chief Justice Cockburn would resume his duties at the Geneva Board, and that the British counter case would be laid before Parliament at an early day.

The subject was discussed by Earl Russell, Duke of Richmond, Lord Westbury, Marquis of Salisbury, Duke of Somerset, Lords Penzance, Denmore and Colonsay.

In the Commons, later in the evening, Mr. Lawson moved an address for the withdrawal of Great Britain from any treaty binding her not to interfere with other nations at war.

A Belfast deputation, with an invitation signed by 30,000 citizens, waited on Mr. Gladstone, asking him to visit them and deliver an address; which he agreed to do.

FRANCE.—Gambetta continues his tour throughout France, in which he urges the definite establishment of a Republic.

Forty thousand women of Alsace and Lorraine have addressed a petition to Prince Bismarck that their fathers and sons should be exempted from service in the German army for a few years.

In Versailles prison 22 Communists are under sentence of death.

GERMANY.—The German Parliament opened on Monday the 8th. In the absence of the emperor the speech from the Throne was made by Prince Bismarck. He enumerated several matters of future legislation and congratulated the Government upon the success of its policy in strengthening the confidence of all Foreign Powers.

The German Bishops will meet in Fulda on Wednesday. The Conference is to last two days, and will be held with closed doors. The Archbishop of Cologne is to preside.

Control officers seized yesterday sixty shells and grenades concealed in two market waggons, which entered the gate of Montreal.

ITALY.—The Pope has refused to receive the sum of money offered by the Italian Government declaring that when it became necessary for him to accept alms, as a means of subsistence, he would only receive them from the Catholic world.

Mount Vesuvius is again in a state of violent eruption.

SPAIN.—Disturbances have occurred in large numbers of the Spanish towns, but the Government promptly suppressed them.

The military authorities report that Carlist demonstrations are unimportant. Ample precautions have been taken to prevent an uprising.

Spanish Minister of War, Gen. Dato, has resigned, and Gen. Seacalé succeeds him.

The church of St. Thomas, Madrid, was burned on Friday night. Several persons were killed by the falling walls. The king, Serrano, and the city authorities were on the spot, and used every effort to save the church.

Advices from Madrid announce a general rising of malcontents throughout Spain.

The troubles have grown out of recent diplomatic negotiations between France and Germany, and grave complications are apprehended.

Some admirers of Longfellow have asked the meaning of the design upon the cover of his new book, The Divine Tragedy. It is a beautiful device, and singularly appropriate for the subject, a Greek Cross.
