

RAILWAY ACCIDENT AT BROOKFIELD.—James W. Steyens, Esq., has met with a very serious accident. He writes: On Tuesday, the 23rd of April, I sent my luggage to the Station and soon followed myself. When within a few rods of the road leading to the Station, the Train passed over the road, some 4 or 5 cars by not breaking up in time. This is frequently done, but they at once back to the platform. But on this morning they were stationary for some time after I came to the crossing, and I had known Geldert the Conductor to start on if there was no freight to back for. I saw nothing else for me to do but risk my limbs and pass between two Box Cars as there were no flats on. In doing so I put my foot on the buffer. At that moment the train backed. A sudden jerk caused my foot to slip and caught between the buffers until the train backed to its place. God in his mercy ordered it otherwise or I could not now have my foot as it is, I have a very bad foot only the thin side of my left foot from the ankle joint with two toes was caught, yet my whole foot and leg is black and swollen, I may never get over it. I used nothing but cold water for five days, and I think if in charge of Trains would use more of the same fewer accidents would take place. My sons who pass back and forth over the Pacific Railroad, say that if any man in the employment of the Company was known to take a glass of liquor he would be discharged at once. No excuse would avail. We miss Mr. Lorgley. It is of no use to complain as the road officials will justify themselves. Geldert said after I was taken out, it served me right I had no business there, whereas his negligence was the cause of my being obliged to go there.
