Dominion & Foreign News.

TORONTO.—A large still owned by the Hamilton Carbon Company at Petrolia Ontario, was burned with condenser, derrick and steam engine. Loss, 150,000.

OTTAWA.—Stewart's Block, was burned on Saturday night, loss \$24,000 including \$9,000 on Mortimer's building, and \$5000 on Allan's china store.

The Railway Commissioners have a warded contracts for station buildings in Nova Scotia district, as follows: Little Forks station, to Douglas, Cove & Co; River Philip station, to Rupert P. Donkin; Iron Mines and DeBert stations, to Leo Perry and Co.

P. E. ISLAND.

The Revenue of P. E. Island for the past year amounts to £118,668 16s. 11d., of which £9,849 3s. 10., were received from public lands, and about £15,000 from the Railway 2 1/2 per cent.

The Government has been defeated. The Opposition was invited to form a government, but they being unable to do so, the House of Assembly was dissolved.

UNITED STATES.

A resolution was introduced in Congress on Friday by Representative Brooks, of New York, looking to a protectorate over Mexico.

The Massachusetts Legislature, by one majority, refused to withdraw the right from towns and cities to allow sales of ale and cider.

The appearance of Andrew J. Garvey as witness against Mayor Hall, causes panic among Tammany Ring thieves. Garvey turned States evidence.

The burning of Jayne's building in Philadelphia on Friday last involves a loss of over a million of dollars.

Seven steamboats, with their cargoes, were burned at Cincinnati on Friday. Loss a quarter of a million.

Ice in the East and North Rivers seriously impedes navigation.

Ex-Emperor Napoleon cleared \$32,000 by selling estate corner of Dey St. and Broadway, to the Western Union Telegraph Co.

Capt. Joseph Bryant, his wife and two young grand children were all burned to death with their dwelling in Machiasport, Me., on Friday last.

The contributions of England to the Chicago sufferers amount to £162,000. New York, March 11.—Gold 10 1/2, Exchange 10 1/2. Money 7 per cent.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.

The Queen leaves for Germany on the 26th inst., and returns on the 20th April.

The Commission of Medical men appointed to examine as to the sanity of Arthur O'Connor, the assailant of the Queen find that man of sound mind but an enthusiastic Fenian. In explaining to the Commission why his weapon was not loaded, he said he would have used a loaded pistol, but only desired to frighten the Queen into compliance with his demand, any fatal result of his assault would have brought the Prince of Wales to the Throne, and that event he does not desire. He wishes the Queen to be the last English Monarch.

The celebrated Tichborne case suddenly terminated on Wednesday last by the Council for the Claimant announcing that their client had decided, in view of the action of the jury on Monday in saying they had heard sufficient evidence whereon to base a verdict, to withdraw the cause before the court. After this announcement the Counsel for the Defence asked Lord Chief Justice Bovill to issue a warrant for the arrest of the claimant on a charge of perjury, and to fix his bail at fifty thousand pounds. The petition was granted, and Tichborne arrested on a bench warrant and lodged in Newgate.

The trial of the claimant on charge of perjury will take place in April.

In reply to an enquiry in the House of Commons, Viscount Enfield, Under Secretary of the Foreign Department, stated that the Government had no knowledge of the Pope's intention to leave Rome; and that the Pope had made no application to England to place Malta, or any portion of the British Dominions at his disposal.

President Fortescue, of the Board of Trade, announced in the House of Commons that the Government were negotiating a Shipping Convention with the United States.

Operatives in the Silk Factories of Leeds in Staffordshire, to the number of 38,000, have been locked out for refusing the terms offered to them by their masters. This throws one third of the town population out of work.

Fifteen hundred coal miners, in the County Durham, are on a strike for higher wages.

Copies of the American case as submitted to the Geneva arbitration, were to be distributed in both Houses of Parliament on Saturday.

The operatives of the Flax Mills at Leeds have struck for the reduction of the time of labor to 9 hours. They are orderly and no trouble is apprehended. The number on strike is between 10,000 and 11,000.

Despatches from Calcutta announce that the expedition against the Loosbais having accomplished its object, peace will be soon proclaimed.

The Earl of Lonsdale died on the 5th inst., aged 85 years.

John Bright in a letter to the Anti-Income Tax Association, declares that only in the reduction of Government expenditures is there a chance for the abolition of this odious tax, and advocates the withholding of confidence from a Government taking seventy millions annually from the nation's industry.

In the House of Commons there was a long debate on remedying defects in the Education Law. An Amendment by Mr. Forster that the Law has not had a fair trial, was adopted 323 to 93.

A bill has been introduced for purchase by Government of railways in Ireland.

The "Times" exceptionally mentions the friendly tone of the American press towards England.

The Marquis and Marchioness of Lorne have arrived in London on a visit to the Queen, previous to her departure for Germany.

FRANCE.—A conflict between the French Assembly and the Government is imminent, and another ministerial crisis is expected. In the Assembly the election of Rouher from Corsica was agreed to. The debate was continued on the bill imposing penalties for connection with the International Society. Louis Blanc declared the passage of such a measure would throw France back centuries.

Sontor, editor of the "Corsaire," fought a duel on Tuesday last in Paris with Rogat of the "Pays." The latter was wounded twice.

Signor Minghetti is expected in Paris on a private mission from the King of Italy to Theirs, concerning the Roman question.

Drafts have been signed for 330,000,000 francs, part payment of anticipatory war indemnity.

A movement is on foot for the liberation of the country from German occupation, and the ministry pledged thereto, all constitutional questions to be shelved until that end is accomplished.

Thiers, in reply to the English deputation, stated that the present passport system was only temporary, and promised encouragement for the Tunnel project. The Prefect of the Rhone asks for Military reinforcements for the maintenance of order, which is menaced by the rapid increase of workmen's clubs and illegal secret societies. The ex-prefect of the Eure was acquitted and honorably discharged.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the French Cable Co, it was resolved to lay another cable to America under the management of the present cable combination.

The payment of two milliards of war indemnity, with interest to date on remaining three milliards, was completed on Thursday. This gives France entire control of six departments, in which she is allowed to maintain as large a military force as she desires.

The Assembly on Friday rejected the proposition of Deputy Brunet to erect on the hill of Trocadero a temple of Jesus Christ as testimony to a belief of God as necessary for the national regeneration.

Two of the Paris Communists, tried for incendiarism in setting fire to the church of St. Louis, have been sentenced to execution.

Congratulatory despatches have been exchanged between Thiers and the Governor of Guadeloupe upon the completion of telegraphic communication between France and that island.

The Prince and Princess of Wales are now in Paris, en route to the South of France. They were received by President Thiers on Monday.

A stormy scene took place in the Assembly on Saturday, and a violent assault was made on M. Thiers by Garaud, who said that Thiers had prevented a Republic or a Monarchy, and nothing remained but Empire or chaos.

SPAIN.—"L'Univers" asserts that a revolutionary plot was recently discovered in Madrid, and that several ringleaders were arrested.

GERMANY.—Gifts by the Emperor of Germany to Generals on the anniversary of the entry into Paris give rise to much comment on account of the largeness of the sums disposed of.

During the debate in the Diet on the School Inspection Bill, Prince Bismarck made a significant speech, expressing his fear of the disloyal influence of the Catholic Clergy, and insisted on the German language being used in the Polish schools.

Shocks of earthquake this afternoon were experienced for over an hour in many places in Germany.

The Prussian Government claims to have discovered the secret appointment by the Pope of Archbishop of Posen as Primate of Poland.

The Upper House of the German Diet have passed a Bill providing for Governmental supervisors of schools.

PORTUGAL.—The Emperor and Empress of Brazil have arrived in Lisbon whence they will sail on the 13th inst. for Rio Janeiro.

AUSTRIA.—It is stated upon official authority that Austria has made no offer of asylum to the Pope, and the reports that he intends to leave Rome are discredited.

ITALY, Rome.—It is said that Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia, while in this city recently on his way to Egypt, declared that if France made an attack upon Italy the latter country would be defended by Germany.

Von Moltke is making a tour of Italy and is now at Naples.

Giuseppe Massini is at Tirano, in the Tyrol, making preparations for a revolutionary invasion of Italy.

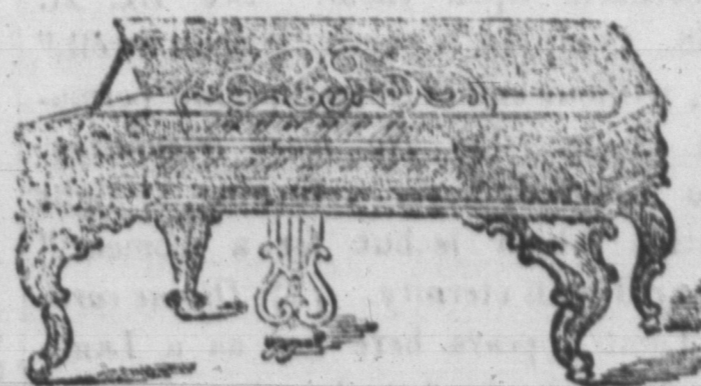

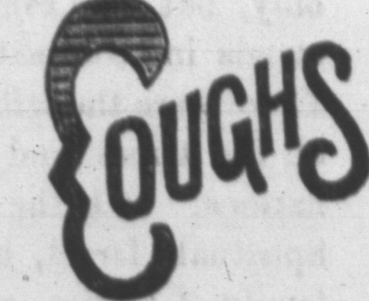
