

OCEAN FERRY.—There is something more than a daily ferry now between Europe and America. In fact the rate is something like a steamer for every twelve hours from the port of Liverpool alone. During the month of May, 53 steamships left the Mersey, of which 17 belong to the Cunard Company, 11 to the Inman, 5 to the National, 5 to White Star, 10 to the Allan, and 6 to the Guion Company, respectively. When to these are added the ships of the French and German lines, we get some idea of the prodigious increase of late in steam-communication between the continents.
