

The German Government has issued a second circular, still more threatening, against emigrants. Despite the menaces immigration has only been slightly affected.

The inviolability of private property at sea in the time of war is one of subjects for discussion by the Emperors at their conference at Berlin, and the Premiers of Austria, Russia, and Prussia, seem interested in the final establishment of this principle.

It is reported that Von Armin has tendered his resignation as Minister of Germany to France, in consequence of the unpleasantness he experiences in Parisian society. It is stated that if Armin's resignation be accepted, the Embassy to France will remain vacant, and Germany be represented at Paris only by Consul.

AUSTRIA.—The Reichsrath was opened on Tuesday last. In his opening address the President took occasion to refer to the recent conference of the Emperors at Berlin. He said the understanding there aimed at was a certain guarantee of peace for Europe for some years to come.

ITALY.—The anniversary of the occupation of Rome by the Italian troops was celebrated on Saturday with much enthusiasm. The city was profusely decorated.

The Pope received visits of condolence from his adherents, and addressed his visitors, lamenting the misfortunes to the Catholic Church and the injustice done it by the Italian Government.

SWEDEN & NORWAY.—King Charles of Sweden died at Malmo on Wednesday last. Prince Oscar, brother of the deceased King, has succeeded to the throne of Sweden and Norway.

SPAIN.—King Amadeus said in his speech at the opening of the Cortes, that Spain is determined to subdue the Cuban rebellion, and will send all the additional troops needed.

Don Carlos is said to have written a letter to the Pope, promising a speedy renewal of the Carlist insurrection.

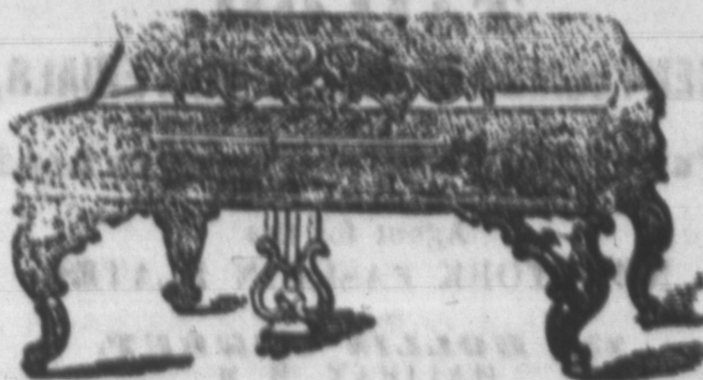
