News of the Week.

DROWNED.—Penj. Carpenter and Arch. Beaton, natives of Nova Scotia, were drowned on the Grand Banks, by the upsetting of a dory belonging to the American schooner Sarah Payer, a few weeks ago.

THE NEW ATLANTIC CABLES are being laid from the New Cable-house near Steele's pond toward Point Pleasant, by the steamship Kangaroo, out to sea about ten miles opposite Chebucto Head; there the end to be buoyed until the arrival of the Great Eastern with the other ends to join to them. One was laid on Saturday last, and the other one was being laid yesterday.

COMING BACK.—The Kentville Star says that several persons who lately left Kings County for the United States have returned home, finding they can do better here than there.

The "ATLANTIC" WRECK is still the great theme—and will be for some time to come. Steam tugs go down every fine day taking passengers at \$2 00 a head. The goods are being raised and shipped off to New York. There still about 200 bodies that have not yet been recovered.

PROTECTION OF HALIFAX.—Some very heavy Armstrong guns were hauled from the Ordnance yard to Point Pleasant batteries last week.

THE GRANVILLE FERRY Ship Building Company, have now in course of construction a barque of 600 tons. This will be the fifth vessel built by this company.

"LITTLE HINGES" was the subject of the 4th Lecture of the present season delivered before the Acadia Athenaeum, by Avar Longley, Esq., in the Vestry of the Baptist Chapel, Wolfville, on Friday evening, April 11th.

The object of the lecture was to show that great events often follow from circumstances comparatively unimportant. This the lecturer illustrated by reference to Scripture history, to the works of nature, to the developments of Science, and to many of the leading events of ancient and modern times.

The lecturer spoke feelingly of the loss of the Steamship "Atlantic," and thought that the small causes which may have produced that terrible calamity prove that great events often turn on "little hinges."

The next lecture before the Athenaeum will be delivered (D. V.) on Friday evening next, April 18th, by Rev. J. Read, of Grafton St. Church, Halifax.

SUSPENSION OF THE TWO LIVERPOOL BANKS.—The two banks, viz, the Bank of Liverpool and the Bank of Acadia, doing business at Liverpool, Queen's County, suspended payment on Monday. We are not in a position to state the extent of the banks' liabilities, but understand that they are small, and that the suspension will only be temporary.
