News of the Week.

PUBLICATIONS RECEIVED.—The Maritime Monthly for June completes the first volume of this very popular magazine. It has continued to improve from the first.

The sixth annual report of the Halifax Young Men's Wesleyan Institute. The number of members on the record is 136.

A Mrs. Mitchell, who resided on Canaan Road, near Kentville, was found dead in her house on Tuesday. It is supposed she died from bleeding at the lungs.

The Kentville Star reports that a young man named Shaw miraculously escaped losing his life in the Berwick Steam Mills, on Monday last. He was operating in the clothes pin department, when the sleeve of his shirt caught in a shaft which was running at the rate of 240 revolutions per minute. The clothes were stripped from his body, but he escaped with some slight cuts and bruises.

The summer term of the Supreme Court for Hants County opened at Windsor on Tuesday, His Honor Judge McCully presiding. We learn from the "Mail" that an address, signed by the High Sheriff, members of the Bar, Magistrates, Clergymen and other citizens, was presented to His Honor by the Sheriff, J. M. Geldert Esq., to which the Judge made an appropriate reply.

On Wednesday, Silas Marsters, indicted for burning a barn belonging to Joseph Fish, at Scotch Village was tried and found guilty. Wm. Cochran was indicted for complicity in the burning of this barn, and his trial was set down for Friday.

THE DRUMMOND COLLIERY.—The Pictou "Standard" reports that matters at the coal fields at Westville are beginning to look much more favorable than was at one time apprehended. While it is impossible to say precisely what the present condition of the Drummond Colliery is, or what is the extent of damage done in the works underground, there are strong reasons for believing that the fire has been got under control, and that it will before long be entirely subdued, so as to allow operations for re-opening the mine to be proceeded with.

THE PARK, THAT IS TO BE.—Sir Wm. Young has been chosen Chairman, His Worship the Mayor Vice Chairman, and Ald. Thompson Secretary. Messrs. Neal, L. G. Power, Stairs and Doull were appointed a committee to confer with the Royal Engineer department relative to improvements in the park.

The Secretary says there is no impediment in the way of immediate operations except the want of funds. The act of last session empowers the City Council to assess \$4,000 for the work, but it was very desirable that the improvements should be commenced at once, as the finest part of the season will have passed before the City Treasurer will be in funds from the assessment. Under these circumstances the Chief Justice has kindly advanced the means necessary for the work, and through the enterprise and public spirit of the Colonel of the Engineer corps, with the sanction of the General commanding, numbers of military workmen have been employed at a very reasonable rate, so that a large amount of work has been done upon the Park, which promises to be a most valuable domain for the people of Halifax, and an attractive place of resort for visitors from abroad.

Civic.—Our Natal Day.—The City Council, on Friday last agreed to expend \$800 of the people's money in keeping a holiday on the 23rd of June—the 21st coming on Saturday. That amount appropriated to some object that would be a permanent benefit to the city would be far better than what has usually characterized such celebrations. They have frequently been demoralizing and disgraceful.

DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.—The Amherst "Gazette" says.—"Tony Melancon, one of the oldest residents of Minudie, aged about 100 years, died at that place on Monday last.

THE RAILWAY TERMINUS.—The resolution submitted by Ald. L. G. Power at a previous meeting, recommending that the railway be extended into the city on the west side of Water Street, in case the right of way through the Dockyard could not be got, was passed unanimously, without discussion.

POSTAL.—The Post Office in this city will hereafter be kept open until 10 o'clock at night instead of 9.30, as heretofore. And on Saturday nights until 11 if the mails have not all been assorted.

The Way Offices at Hubbard's Cove and Sheet Harbor, Halifax County, and Little Bras d'Or, C. B., were made regular Post Offices on the same date.—The Sheet Harbor office was also made a Money Order office.

FATAL BOAT ACCIDENT.—On Sunday morning a man named Thomas Dryden, of the Department of Mines and Works, left the city in a boat belonging to the Department for a sail on the harbor, taking with him another man, a baker, named Daniel McDonald, and a boy named Frank Brooks. There was a strong breeze blowing at the time. When in the Eastern Passage opposite Lawlor's Island, the boat, unable to carry the sail that was crowded on her, capsized and sank. Some persons who were also sailing in the vicinity ran their boat to the scene of the accident as quickly as possible and succeeded in saving the two men, Dryden and McDonald. Young Brooks sank and drowned before the rescuers reached him. He was about 13 years of age, and a son of Mr. George Brooks of the Fish Market.

PERSONAL.—Hon. A. DeCosmos, (formerly Mr. Smith of Halifax) Premier of British Columbia, arrived in this city last week from Ottawa.

HANTS ELECTION.—Mr. Frame, it is understood has withdrawn his candidature for the representation of the county of Hants.

DARTMOUTH.—The Town Council have appointed Mr. Thomas Short, Town Clerk and Treasurer.

Peter McNab, who stabbed Mr. Leadley, in Dartmouth, a short time ago, has been committed for trial at the next sittings of the Supreme Court.

The Times, now published at Bridgewater, Lunenburg Co., is to be removed to Annapolis Royal.

ANNAPOLIS TO ST. JOHN N. B.—The steamer "Soud" will be taken off the route between St. John and Annapolis this week and the "Empress" which has been thoroughly refitted, will perform the service during the summer months. She will cross the Bay on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays.

FIRES IN ANNAPOLIS COUNTY.—On Sunday last fires were raging in the woods on the Liverpool road, near Annapolis town, causing considerable damage to the timber and cultivated lands. At Greywood, fences and wood piles were consumed, and it required great exertion to save the dwellings and outbuildings belonging to Hugh McDowell and Anthony Spurr. At Millford the damage is more serious. Thos. Whitman has lost his house and barn, together with the stock and furniture. A saw mill owned by A. W. Corbett was on fire; but through the efforts of his son and others, who were fortunately on the ground, it was saved. Other and heavy fires were burning in different parts of the county.

ACCIDENT TO A DIVER.—One of the divers working at the "Atlantic" wreck had a narrow escape from death a few days ago. While he was working below some bars of iron, which were being hoisted up, gave way and fell upon him, breaking his helmet and cutting the air pipe. He had the presence of mind to give the danger signal, and was pulled up in an exhausted condition.

THE SOUTH SEA MISSION.—LOSS OF THE "DAYSPRING."—By the last mail from Australia, via England, letters were received here from Sydney, N. S. W., announcing the total wreck of the mission brigantine "Dayspring." She ventured to remain at the South Sea Islands during the hurricane months, was cast ashore and became a total wreck. The "Dayspring" was a vessel of 115 tons, built at New Glasgow ten years ago, and sent out by the Presbyterians of this Province as a mission ship to the South Sea Islands. Rev. Joseph Annand and his wife were, at the date of the letter, in Sydney, waiting means of conveyance to the Islands. Mrs. Goodwill and infant were also there, sick.—Chronicle

PEREAUX, CORNWALLIS.—Two boys of 3 and 10 years old, sons of Mr. Gibbs, West of Pereaux, were playing with a hayoutter in the barn a few days ago, when the smaller turned the machine while the hand of the elder was in contact with the knives, which cut off all the fingers of the left hand, leaving only about half an inch of the thumb and small finger. It was some time before the machine could be unscrewed and the hand extricated. The little fellow bore his sufferings manfully and his wound is rapidly healing.
