

celebrated in Madrid on Friday night by a general illumination. The streets were crowded. No disorder.

Despatches from the provinces report tranquility continues, excepting in districts disturbed by Carlists. It is said, however, the army is opposed to the Republic and favors a monarchy, but is divided in its choice for ruler between the Duke of Montpensier and the ex-Queen Isabella.

Don Carlos entered Spain on Thursday last. The Carlists are working vigorously to advance the interests of their leader.

Saragossa is practically blockaded by insurgents. The United States Minister to Spain has conveyed to President Figueras, the congratulations of President Grant, and his recognition of Figueras' authority. No demonstrations have yet been made against the new Government.

The Portuguese Government has asked the Cortes to call out 9,000 men of reserve as an army of observation on the frontier.

Senor Zúñiga has arrived in Portugal. The British squadron in the Tagus has been placed at the disposal of the ex-King. Despatches from San Fernando report the steamship Marillo has been released and suffered to depart.

PORTUGAL.—There has been an insurrection of the natives against the Portuguese authorities in Leonda, on the southwest coast of Africa. Portuguese troops have been sent to the colony.

GREECE.—L'Opinion says that the Emperor of Austria has consented to act as arbitrator for the settlement of the Laurium Mines dispute.

SWITZERLAND.—The Swiss Federal Council has addressed a letter to the Papal Charge d'Affaires, denying sharply his right in Switzerland. The Council also requires Bishop Merilliot to decide quickly whether he intends to obey the Pope or the Swiss Government.

ITALY.—The carnival was brilliantly inaugurated in Rome. The streets were filled with pleasure seekers.

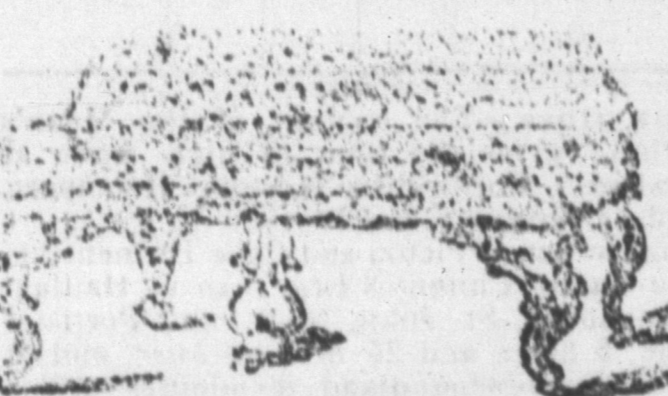
