News of the Week.

The Universalists of Halifax are proposing to erect a new place of worship in Brunswick St., nearly opposite the Methodist Church. The site has been purchased from H. G. Hill Esq., for \$6000.

INTEREST.—The Halifax Chamber of Commerce last week agreed to petition the Dominion Parliament for the abolition of the present usury laws, substituting therefor a law similar to that of Ontario or New Brunswick—in the latter province no higher than 7 per cent can be recovered by law.

CIVIC.—Ald. Ackhurst has been chosen Chairman of the City Board of Works.

The Sheriffs for the several counties in the Province have been re-appointed for the ensuing year.

THE MAILS.—A ton and a half of the delayed mails by the Intercolonial railway were brought from Londonderry to Truro on Saturday in sleighs, and arrived in Halifax on Saturday night. About two tons more were sent via Annapolis. The delayed and other mails from all directions that came to the Halifax office on Monday made one hundred and ninety three bags, weighing about five tons.

SERVED THEM RIGHT.—In the Police Court on Monday, two men named John Lannen and John Collier, were fined \$4 each for setting a dog and cat to fight.

A few days ago the dwelling house of Mr. John Lloyd, at Port Mouton, was burned down, and furniture, clothing and bedding destroyed.

A man named Rafter, belonging to Hammonds Plains, was killed at Margaret's Bay on Friday last, by a tree falling on him, while he was at work in the woods.

Mr. Jeremiah Minkins, of Long Point, Cornwallis, committed suicide, on the 26th ult., by cutting his throat. For some time past Mr. Minkins had been depressed that he would come to want, but otherwise seemed quite sane. The deceased was in very comfortable circumstances, and was much respected.

Employing cheap Chinese labor is not the best thing in the world for the interests of the manufacturers in San Francisco. No sooner do they learn the art of making the things, principally boots, and shoes, and cigars, so far, than they turn and set up for themselves, selling at much lower rates. They make nearly all the cigars in San Francisco now.

A hurricane which occurred at Panama, recently was very severe in its effects. Its force was such that two large schooners were driven sixty or seventy feet into the wharf, destroying considerable property and merchandise. Other vessels were driven ashore, and there were some loss of life. The pecuniary danger will not be much short of a million and a half of dollars.

A new steam street car has had a successful trial in Louisville. The citizens like it, but the mules do not.

Cars run from Joppa to Jerusalem in two hours.

The National Deaf Mute College at Washington is the only institution in the world where deaf mutes receive a regular collegiate education. The conditions for admission are the same as at other colleges, and they require no more time to complete their course.
