BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA .- At the recent annual meeting of the sharel olders of the Bank of Nova Scotia, the report presented showed that the earning of the Bank for the last two years has restored it to its former position as regards amount of c pital, and that the business had increased to such an ex ent as to justify the Directors in recommending an increase of the capital stock. It was accordingly proposed, and all but unanimously voted, that the directors beauthorized to increase the stock from \$560. 000 to \$1,000,000-the additional shares to be called up at such intervals and to such an amount as may be deemed necessary. The new profits of the bank for 1872 were \$78.000

MAITLAND, HANTS, is continuing actively engaged in ship-building. The Windsor Mail give a list and description of the ships and vess is that are being built and are about to be commenced there. Other matters of interest in relation to the shipping belonging to Hants county are noticed. For instance it states that in four years and three months the ship "Pegasus," 1120 tons, owned by Win. Lawrence, Eq., of Maitland, cleared the very handsome sum of \$82,716 paying for herself nearly twice over, in fact, leaving the very ereditable surplus over her cost of \$36,916. The bark " Persia," also owned by Mr. Lawrence, has been a very profitable vessel. He owned her for five years, and during that time, though she was kept insured all the while, she cleared £10,000 and was then sold for £1,400. She was launched in 1859 and cost £2 600 old currency, so she clean d in five years the nice little sum of £8,800 Mr. Lawrence is now building the largest ship ever built in this province. The length of keel is 244 feet, breadth of beam 47 feet; depth of hold 29 feet; length of deck 260 feet; length over all, from taffrails to lightheads, 267 feet. Measurement, old tonnage (Carpenters) 2627 tons; and she will register in the neighborhood of 2400 or 2500 tons. She is to be diagonally sealed in the strongest manner, and is to have three tall decks, and eight tier of kilsons right through her, and three tier of stanchions, centre stanchions, and bilge stanchions. The frame was obtained from Kennetcook, and the heavy timber from Stewnacke. Mr. Lawrence began to lay the keel in September, and he intends to launch her in the summer of 1874.
