Captain Jouvillar on Thursday last issued an address to the inhabitants of Cuba. saying: - " The moment a treaty is signed be tween the Governments of Spain and the United States, my duty, although painful it may be, is to comply faithfully with its terms. For this I have received final orders ;- a failure to comply with the same would produce war, and a war with a great power without the aid of Spain. In the meanwhile obey the law of necessity and orders as the Government of the Spanish Republic. Let us deliver up the "Virginius" and the survivors of her passengers and crew. I have faith in the nobleness of your procedure in compliance with my word.
