BIGAMY CASE.—John F. Conrod alias Frederick Conway was under examination on Friday last before Mr. Justice Shields, on a charge of bigamy. James A. Cur, stated that he had known the prisoner since 1868 as John F. Conrod; that he was present at a ceremony, performed by the Rev. David S. Moore, by which the prisoner and Emma Heidenberg were married; that he knew they had since lived together as man and wife; and that he had seen and spoken to the latter several times during the past year. Mr. Meagher submitted as evidence two marriage certificates.

Mrs. Anna Taylor, of Hantsport, testified that she had known the prisoner since 1871,—as Frederick Conway; that she was present on the 8th of June, 1871; when the Rev. Mr. Wallace, Baptist Minister, married the prisoner under the name of Frederick Conway, to Mrs. Theresa Carmichael; that she knew they had a nest, till within a few weeks, lived together as man and wife.

Assistant Deputy Marshall Power testified to having arrested the prisoner and talked with him concerning the subject on which he was arrested. On one occasion he admitted having married Mrs. Carmichael while a former wife was still living, but said that he was drunk at the time of the ceremony.

The prosecutor, Mrs. Carmichael, was sworn and testified that she was acquainted with the accused three or four weeks, and married to him seven days after their acquaintance, and that he was not drunk when the ceremony was performed.

The testimony of the last witness closed the case for the prosecution, and no defence was put in. The prisoner was then committed for trial at Annapolis.

A NOVA SCOTIAN MURDERED. At the Southampton, G. B., Petty Sessions, on the 2nd of January, Axel Emil Brobeck, a young Swedish sailor, was brought up, charged with having murdered Howard L. Croseup, of Granville, N. S., mate of the New Brunswick barque "Emma F. Secor," on the 1st of October, while on the passage from Montreal to Montevideo. The prisoner was remanded for one week.

NOVA SCOTIA STEAMSHIP COMPANY.—A meeting of the directors of the Nova Scotia Steamship Company, was held at the Halifax Hotel, on Thursday afternoon. Mr. Fishwick laid before the meeting the scheme for the construction or purchase of two steamers, which, with the "M. A. Starr," he would run along the shore, East and West of Halifax. He had obtained from an eminent engineer in New York a plan and model for a new steamer, which he proposes should be constructed in the Province. The committee of last year, enlarged by the addition of J. Taylor Wood, was appointed to prepare a prospectus, solicit subscriptions of stock, and to report at a meeting to be held at an early day.—Col.
