No. 2. (Through Passenger Express) will leave St. John at 8 a.m. and be due in Halifax at 9.30 p.m.

(These Trains will only stop at Ticket Stations between Pictou and St. John, and at Shubenacadie and Windsor Junction (between Halifax and Truro) except for cross-trains or to put down passengers who may be on board before reaching Truro going South, and at Pictou when going West.)

Nos. 3 & 5. (Pictou Mail) will leave Halifax at 6.30 a.m. and be due at Pictou at 12.45 p.m.

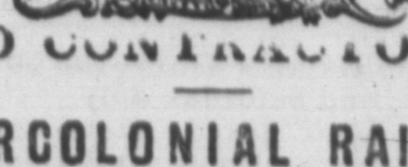
