

THE CONVENTION MINUTES.

A desire was expressed at the late Session of Convention that the Minutes of the Session should have incorporated with them a summary of the Associations, &c. The Committee appointed by the Convention to take charge of the printing of the Minutes, have adopted the suggestion, and we have taken some pains to correspond with parties, collect materials, and put them into a little different form, with a slight enlargement, giving them the title, "BAPTIST YEAR BOOK," with a table of Contents to facilitate reference to what it contains. The whole of the copy did not come to hand for more than a month after the session.

It is hoped that this will to some extent meet the wishes of the brethren. It may be still further improved upon in future years, if thought desirable. We doubt not the institutions for which the Convention exists, will be benefited by having their Annual Reports, and the Minutes, put in a more attractive form.

They will doubtless be more read than heretofore, and an additional amount of interest will be awakened in them. The parcels were forwarded to all the churches the week before last and the postage paid. We regret that by a late regulation of the Post office, charging one cent for every two ounces the cost of sending them is just double what it was before.

On the 3rd page with the list of names forming the Board of Foreign Missions, the names of the Secretaries should have appeared, as follows:—REV. DR. CRAMP, Foreign Secretary and REV. W. B. BOGGS, Home Secretary.

On the 47th page the 1st line for "Western," read "Eastern" and in line 29th for "Eastern" read "Western."

Evangelical Alliance meetings are still being held in Halifax. The interest is by no means exhausted or diminished. A meeting was to be held in Dartmouth Presbyterian Church last evening and in Granville Street Church to-morrow Thursday evening. Rev. G. W. Hill is expected to give an Address on "The discussion of the Scientific Antagonisms to the Scriptures at the Alliance Conference;" Rev. John Lathern on "The Pulpit for the Age," as treated of at the Alliance Conference, especially the views of Rev. Joseph Parker, D. D., of London;" and Rev. Allan Simpson, on the Alliance and its effects, &c.

If time permits addresses may be expected from Rev. G. M. Grant, John Read and others.

We copy the following from the Witness:—

A remark was made by Rev. E. M. Saunders at the Evangelical Alliance meeting on Tuesday night which deserves to be noted and remembered. One effect, he said, which the Conference had on himself was that he would sooner have his own feelings hurt than that he should hurt the feelings of a brother. Were this state of mind and heart to prevail among Christians what a changed world we should have! Often we forget when we are smiting hard that a brother suffers under our blows.

The English Baptist Union held its Autumn Session on Wednesday the 15th ult., at Nottingham. It was preceded by a sermon on Monday evening by Rev. Mr. Clifford and a Missionary Conference and Public Meeting on Tuesday evening at the latter meeting an assembly of nearly 3000 persons gathered in the Mechanics Institute.

The Session of the Union opened in Storey Street Chapel and was very largely attended. Dr. Underhills Address on Christian Mission was a very able one as might be expected from him on the historic ground where the Session was being held. About 600 names of Ministers and Delegates were handed in.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. J. W. HART OF ST. JOHN.—It was only a few weeks ago that we recorded the sudden death of J. W. Hart, Esq., with-out a moment's premonition. We were greatly surprised to hear of the death of Mrs. Hart last week at the same sudden manner. At 11 o'clock in the evening she was in her usual health, before 12 she was amongst the departed. With the bereaved family we have the deepest sympathy and sorrow at the removal of one so worthy and well beloved.

We are glad to learn that Rev. John Davis is convalescent, and has resumed his ministerial duties.

The want of a High School in Halifax, referred to by Professor DeMill at the Dalhousie College inauguration last week is a very serious one. Mr. Rand while Superintendent of Education in this province urged on the School authorities the establishment of such a school, as the complement of our system in this city, and showed how it might be done with but little addition of expense to the Province or the City, but his counsels were not heeded, or not effectually adopted, and we are still without a public school in Halifax, except of the most inferior description. The best teachers of the city schools have, we regret to say left the employment, and until different counsels prevail with those in charge of this matter, there is but little hope for improvement.

News of the Week.

THE SEASON thus far has been remarkably mild. Halifax has yet to see its first snow. Two or three nights last week were somewhat cold, ice having formed about half an inch in thickness in the shallow pools of water, but the bright sun soon released them, and overcoats were pretty generally discarded. If we may regard this beginning of winter as an indication of what the whole is to be, we may hope that after the two past severe seasons we may anticipate one more favorable, which, under the present high price of fuel, will be a great mercy to all classes.

GOLD.—Mr. T. B. Donaldson, of Oldham, brought to town last week a bar of gold, weighing 126 ounces, which was the product of 32 tons of quartz.

THE DEPARTURE OF THE ROYAL ALFRED with Admiral Fanshaw, last Tuesday, was a most beautiful sight on our harbor. The yards were manned from the deck to the highest point of each mast. The Admiral's family having embarked in the mailsteamer "Austrian," both ships left at the same time, interchanging cheers. The band of the 60th Rifles on board a steam-tug, accompanied the two ships to the mouth of the harbor. Crowds assembled on the wharves, and exchanged cheers with those on board the two ships.

SUPREME COURT.—In the trial of John B. Gray last week the prosecution failed to prove the charge of embezzlement and he was pronounced by the jury "Not guilty."

Dalhousie College Convocation was held in Argyle Hall on Wednesday last. Principal Ross presided, and Lieutenant Governor Archibald, Chief Justice Young, and others occupied seats on the platform. The inaugural address was delivered by Professor DeMill, of the Arts Faculty, who strongly advocated the establishment of a Provincial University, but did not think the prospects of one being soon established were very good. Dr. Summers, of the Medical Faculty also read an address, and short speeches were made by the Lieutenant Governor and Chief Justice.

We learn from the Chronicle that there are 20 new students in Arts and 15 in Medicine.

MR. CARSWELL is come! The visit of this famous lecturer to the city about 8 or 10 years ago was not forgotten, and he received a hearty welcome from a large number of brethren in the Division room on Thursday evening. He lectured on Friday evening, and described the Temperance cause as the life-boat of the ship Religion, doing for it the work of rescuing the lost ones. On Sunday evening at 8 past 8 P. M. he lectured again to a crowded audience filling Temperance Hall to its utmost capacity, and hundreds were unable to obtain admission. Again on Monday evening he occupied the platform with the same marked ability and practicalness as on his former visit.

A VALUABLE PRIZE.—On Friday evening a steam-tug brought in the ship "R. Robinson," of New York, laden with a valuable cargo of cotton, grain, and oil cake. The vessel was abandoned at sea, and was fallen in with on the 3rd inst., in lat 45-10, long, 63, by the Cunard Steamship "Abyssinia," from New York to Liverpool. The latter towed the abandoned ship to Sambro, and having placed a crew on board, a tug brought the prize to this port. The "Abyssinia" proceeded on her voyage. The number of fire arms lying about, some loaded and others unloaded, gives rise to the supposition that a mutiny had occurred on board the abandoned ship. The "R. Robinson" has fourteen feet of water in her hold.

ACCIDENT TO COL. LAURIE.—In Picton on Friday, while Colonel Laurie, Deputy Adjutant General, was proceeding to the parade ground to conduct a militia inspection, his waggon broke down and he was thrown out, breaking his right arm. Notwithstanding the accident he went through the inspection not knowing the full extent of the injury, till afterwards, when medical aid was sent for by telegraph, and the injured limb properly set before returning to his home.

SAD ACCIDENT.—On the 1st inst. a child twenty-one months old, belonging to the Rev. Mr. Forbes, Goshen, Antigonish, was found drowned in a pool of water scarcely more than a foot deep.

A correspondent of the Express at Isaac's Harbor states that as Mr. Kinsman Sweet formerly of Cornwallis, was driving in a waggon, accompanied by his wife, from Country Harbor, the horse ran away, throwing both out of the waggon. Mr. and Mrs. Sweet sustained severe injuries from the fall.

A man named John Blackburn was drowned on Monday while crossing in a boat from Port Medway to Mill Village, Queens County.

SPRING HILL.—A collision occurred here on Thursday afternoon between two ballast trains. One engine and two tenders were very much damaged. No person was hurt.

OUTRAGE AT BRIDGETOWN.—On Monday evening of last week, the school-house of this town was entered by some persons unknown, who tore down the maps, upset the desks, broke several panes of glass in the windows and carried away all the books of the school. The books were subsequently found strewn along the road or in the river. This is the second time the school house has been visited in this manner within three weeks. It is to be hoped that the perpetrators of these outrages will be discovered and severely punished.

SUPPOSED MURDER.—A young man named Newcomb formed one of the crew of a coasting schooner recently lying at Maria Joseph. The rest of the crew were very much under the influence of liquor when Newcomb returned on board in the evening:—During the night some fighting was heard and in the morning young Newcomb was missing. His body was afterwards found in the water alongside of the vessel. No inquest was held. The body was buried; but whispers began to circulate of foul play; and fourteen days afterwards the body was disinterred, and an inquest held. A post mortem examination revealed the fact that the breast was broken in; there was a deep gash in the throat; and the face was much cut and bruised. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict that the deceased came to his death by violent means at the hands of some person or persons unknown. The schooner on board which the young man was employed has since been at this port, and is expected back in a day or two from P. E. Island.—Express.
