

The Annapolis "Farmer" reports that Mr. Alfred Munroe, while working in the saw mill of Messrs. Walsh & Co. at Bear River, fell dead instantaneously. A post-mortem examination was held, but no satisfactory reason could be assigned for his death.

At the Supreme Court at Annapolis, last week, the Grand Jury, Magistrates, and Bar presented Judge McCully with a highly complimentary address. The learned Judge made an appropriate reply.

DIGNY is to have a new hotel built on the Wade property, quite near the landing. The hotel will be of capacity sufficient to accommodate about 200 persons comfortably, but room could be made for 250 if necessary. The estimated cost of the building is \$16,000. It is expected that the building will be completed and ready to enter by the 1st of July.

CAPE BRETON.—The Cheese Factory started at Mabou, last June, is doing a good business. The establishment turns out about 350 pounds of cheese per week.

LIVERPOOL.—The Rev. D. McGregor, B. A., of Montreal, has accepted a unanimous call to the pastorate of the Congregational Church in this place.

THE MACKEREL FISHERY.—The North Sydney "Herald" says: "The American fleet of fishermen, now in our harbor, have met with great success in the mackerel fisheries. Fifty barrels have been taken in a day, and twenty and twenty-five barrels is a common catch. The fleet looks very pretty as it leaves the harbor on a morning and returns at night. We fail to see, why, if these fisheries are so profitable to Americans, our own fishermen don't equip smart sailing schooners in a similar manner and share also in the wealth that can be derived from our waters. We may expect next year a fleet of two or three hundred vessels, as the success of the present catch, and the advantages of one of the best harbors in the world for shelter over night, will induce many more to visit us in '75."

A NEW PAPER.—The Western Chronicle, is to be started at Kentville under the management of Mr. J. A. Cogwell.

TEMPERANCE.—The Grand Division of Nova Scotia will meet in Annual Session in this City on 28th inst. The Grand Division of P. E. Island will meet in the previous week.

Delegations from the Grand Divisions of Quebec and P. E. Island are likely to be present at the annual meeting of the Grand Division of Nova Scotia.

One of our earnest temperance workers in Cape Breton, has placed in the hands of the Grand Worthy Patriarch the following suggestions for amendments to our present License Law:—

- 1. Section 30 Chapter 19, Revised Statutes to be amended as follows: "Any person who shall sell or deliver to a minor or Indian, Intoxicating Liquor, &c."
2. The Right of appeal to be allowed the Clerk of License.
3. The Destruction of Liquors where kept for illicit sale; and no licenses to be granted in Coal mining districts.
4. A Liquor agent to be appointed in each electoral districts.
5. Liquor agent to draw on the county Treasury for funds to purchase as stock of liquors suitable to the requirements of the District in which he is appointed.
6. Accommodation for Travellers, Horses; number of persons in family, including servants, to be stated in application for License by each applicant.
7. The name of not more than one applicant to be embodied in any one petition.
8. No groceries, Provisions or Dry Goods to be sold in any Licensed tavern or Liquor store.

These suggestions are really valuable, the result of years of experience; and while it may not be possible to secure all these amendments; and while amendments proposed by other brethren may be deemed more important than some of these, we yet are certain that some parts of the Country, especially where Licenses are still granted, would hail all these changes as barbingers of great progress in the Temperance reform.
