SETTING OUT TREES BY THE ROADSIDE.

HOW TO PRESERVE FENCE POSTS.—A correspondent of the Western Rural says that if fence posts of any kind of timber are covered with a coating of boiled linseed oil, in which pulverized charcoal has been stirred to the thickness of paint, not a man will live long enough to see them rotten.

In opening a great raft blocked up in Red River, La., lasting is resorted to. On one occasion about a week ago, two champagne bottles containing four pounds of nitro-glycerine were sunk about seven feet under water and the explosion was terrific.

To prevent the corrosive action of bilge water upon the iron plates of iron ships, James Young has suggested and tried the use of lime, to neutralize the acid of the water.

Works are now being erected in Pittsburg, Pa., to manufacture pressed bricks with enameled facings. The enamel is made of various colors, to suit the tastes of architects or builders, and is impervious to water or acids.

Petroleum is now used for cleaning guns, and is said to effectually protect them from rust.

THE TIDES.—The column of the Moon's Southing gives the time of high water at Parrsboro', Cornwallis, Horton, Hantsport, Windsor, Newport, and Truro.

FOR THE LENGTH OF THE DAY.—Add 12 hours to the time of the sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising.
