CHURCH DEBTS -Henry Vaughan, Esq., has offered to give \$1000 towards clearing off the debt of about \$5000 from the Germain Street Baptist Church, St. John, N. B. He had To the Editor of the Christian Messenger. previously largely aided the Brussels Street and Pitt Street congregations in removing the debt from their places of worship.

The reference to the removal of Church Debts in St. John, has suggest ed to us the condition of the Halifax Churches in this respect.

The North Baptist Church have an incumbrance on their very commodious edifice, but have for some time past been desirous of removing it, and have, we believe, done something towards it. Its diminution and extinction are a most desirable object at which to aim.

GRANVILLE STREET CHURCH have what is perhaps worse than a debt on a suitable convenient building-for a good while past they have needed more lecture room accommodation, but have been deterred from commencing to erect a new church edifice to enable them to obtain this, from the fear of a heavy debt which they would have to incur. A most eligible site is secured, and we trust the Committee will soon be able to take another step in the accomplishment of a movement so desirable.

During the sickness of the Rev. E. M. Saunders the pulpit has been well supplied by ministering brethren from the city and country. Recent letters from Mr. Saunders indicate great improvement in his health. He is returning by short stages by land.

THE U. S. BAPTIST ANNIVERSA-RIES .- The Baptist churches of Albany have cordially invited the Missionary Union, and Home Mission Society, and the Bible and Publication Society, to hold their anniversaries for the present year in the city of Albany, proffering hospitality for four days to such persons as come expressly to attend the meetings.

The Missionary Union meets on Tuesday morning, May 26th, and continues its sessions till Wednesday noon. The Home Mission Society on Wednesday afternoon, continuing till

Thursday noon, The Bible and Publication Society on Thursday afternoon, and continuing its sessions on Friday.

The New Brunswick School Law has been submitted to the Law officers of the Crown in England. The following is their decision with respect to the claims set up by the Roman Catholie Church to special legislation and privileges :-

"We report that we agree substantially with the opinion expressed by the Minister of Justice, so far as appears from the papers before us. Whatever may have been the practical working of annual education grants in the Province of New Brunswick, the Roman Catholics of that Province had no such rights, privileges, or schools as are the subjects of the enactment in the Act of 1867. It is, of course, quite possible that the new statute of the Province may work in practice unfavourably to this or that denomination therein, and therefore to the Roman Catholics, but we do not think that such a state of things is enough to bring into operation the restraining powers or the powers of appeal to the Governor-General in Council, and the powers of remediat legislation in the Parliament of the Dominion, contained in the 93rd sec. We agree, therefore, in the practical conclusion arrived at by Sir. J. A. Macdonald.
