ENGLAND.—Notwithstanding Mr. Gladstone's expressed desire to retire from public life he has been prevailed upon to resume the Premiership.

When Mr. Gladstone rose to make his statement, the cheering was repeated, this time from all parts of the House.

Mr. Disraeli explained the course he thought proper to pursue since the beginning of the crisis. He confessed that the differences between himself and the Irish Catholics were insurmountable.

Lord Granville announced the decision of the Government, in a speech differing little from that of Mr. Gladstone's.

The Duke of Richmond defended the conduct of the leaders of the Opposition in the crisis. It had been asked, if Mr. Disraeli was not willing to undertake the forming of a Ministry, why did he labor to put the Government in a minority in the House of Commons.

Mr. Lowe will present the annual budget about the 3rd of April. It will show a revenue of \$380,000,000, and an expenditure probably of \$355,000,000.

On Wednesday last a serious riot occurred between the English and Irish in Wolverhampton. Three thousand were engaged. Fire arms and knives were freely used, and much bloodshed resulted, no fatal cases were reported. Order was soon restored.

Three men, believed to be Americans, on Tuesday the 18th, were arrested in Cork, for attempting to deposit \$120,000 in a bank in that city. It was supposed they were the parties who recently committed frauds on the bank of England.

In the House of Commons on Friday evening, Mr. Gathorne Hardy moved an address to the Crown praying that Government be instructed to dissent from the three rules adopted by the court of Arbitration at Geneva.

FRANCE.—The French budget shows a gratifying condition of the public funds. There is now in the treasury half the sum due Germany, and no loan will be required to complete the payments of the war indemnity at the dates designated.

SPAIN.—Confidence in Spanish Government is being rapidly restored by the successes over Carlists.

ITALY.—A despatch from Rome says the Pope gave audience on Tuesday to a hundred Canadians who served in the Pontifical Zouaves. He congratulated the visitors upon their steadfast devotion to the church.

WOODEN SHIPS.—New York, March, 16.—Large orders have been received in this city from Europe for the purchase of first-class wooden vessels to supply the places of the iron ships and barques lost in the terrific storms of the past year.
