PROCEEDINGS OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.

Saint John, N. B., March 11th.

The Board met this afternoon in the Mission Room, King St., at 3 o'clock. Members present: Revs. I. E. Bill, W. P. Everett, G. M. W. Carey; Bro. A. W. Masters, and the Secretary. Prayer by Bro. Everett. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Correspondence, from various quarters, was read, having reference to the support of native proachers.

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to address a circular on the above subject, to the churches and individuals in these Provinces hitherto contributing to the suppert of native preachers in the Mission fields of the American Baptist Mission Union. Also that the Secretary write to Rev. William George, of Henthada, Burmah, on the same subject.

In consequence of hearing of the impaired health of Miss M. B. De-Wolfe, one of our missionaries in Burmah, and of the probability of her being obliged to return to America very soon, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to remit to the Treasurer of the Missionary Union five hundred dollars (\$500 .-00) for the purpose of defraying the expense of Miss DeWolfe's passage home-if necessary-and if it is not needed for that purpose, the same to be placed to our credid in the Treasury of the Union.

Correspondence from Brethren Armstrong and Sanford was read, which was very satisfactory ; those brethren having agreed to comply with the wish of the Board that they should devote the ensuing summer to visiting the churches in the Provinces, and present-

Resolved, That this Board under existing circumstances do not feel that they would be justified in complying with the requests contained in the Rev. Dr's. letter. And that the Secretary of the Board do furnish him with a copy of this Resolution in reply."

With this expression of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society, as represented by the Board of Managers, without a single intimation of what is proposed, or the manner of accomplishing it, the first note of warning of what the Society represented by the Corresponding Secretary are about, the Baptist public gather from the public press, and a Bill presented is pressed to a first and second step of legislation before it is possible to get its contents published. This may perhaps succeed, and the prometors gain some temporary triumph in consequence. We shall see.

1. Incorporation powers.

2. Chap. 47, Acts 1868, chap. 59 and 68, Acts 1865, conditionally repealed and property of corporations established thereby vested in Union.
