A decree issued by the Khan on the 25th ult., abolishes slavery throughout his dominions, and provides all persons held in bondage to be made citizens, or returned to their nations. The Emperor of Austria will go to St. Petersburg in the autumn. The visits regarded by the press as of deep political significance. A cable despatch says that M. de Lesseps, who built the Suez Canal, as the agent of the Khedive, now proposes to build a railway from Russia to British India, as the agent of Russia.
