

STABBING AFFAIR.—In the course of a quarrel concerning a boat-race on Thursday last a policeman Patrick Murphy was stabbed by a seaman named Edward Hoar. It was with some difficulty he was captured under a wharf standing in a corner up to his middle in water.

THE SEASON.—From all parts of the country we learn that the weather has been highly favorable to planting. The late rains have been very beneficial to the grass. The blossoms on the apple and other trees are most abundant and indicate that large crops may be anticipated.

DARTMOUTH.—The members of the new Corporation are proving themselves to be the right men for the position. Their movements thus far have given general satisfaction. On Thursday afternoon the Warden and Councillors, visited the public schools, for the purpose of inspection, and found them conducted in a very satisfactory manner, creditable alike to teachers and pupils.

DOMESTIC INFELICITY.—There was an unfortunate family quarrel last week which caused some excitement in this usually quiet town. A medical gentleman was trying to put out of his house a brother-in-law who with his sister, at the request of the doctor's wife, had come to see her. In this attempt he failed, being set upon by both, and severely beaten with sticks. The doctor escaped by jumping through the window. On appeal to a magistrate a fine of \$10 was levied on the brother-in-law. The trial of the sister was deferred till to-day. A proper appreciation of Scripture precept would remedy and prevent the recurrence of such ebullitions of temper.

ANTAGONISM.—The Casket reports that preparations are being made to resume operations at the Salt Works here in a few days. The Directors have decided to follow the old bore 600 feet deeper so as to get at stronger brine.

YARMOUTH.—The 112th Anniversary of the settlement of this town was celebrated on Monday of last week with unusual enthusiasm.

PICTURE.—The proprietors of the Drummond Colliery are engaged in testing the condition of the works, and have, so far, found matters to be in as favorable a condition as could be expected.

AMHERST.—A few days ago, a child of Mr. Edward Blenkhorn, four years old, went into its father's tannery, and not noticing the vats, slipped into one and was drowned.

SHELburne.—Large quantities of mackerel are being caught off Port LaTour and Cape Sable Island.—Several articles belonging to the ill-fated "Atlantic" drifted ashore near Port LaTour on the 7th inst.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—The Eldorado Gold Mining company shipped to England by the mail steamer Austrian yesterday 500 ounces of Gold \$10,000 worth—the profits of the Wine Harbor operations during the past five months. John Sprague, Esq., the Agent of the Company is evidently the right man to develop the hidden resources of our gold regions. Upwards of 2700 ounces have been made during the past year.

A NEW CAMBRIDGE STORY.—A good story is being told in Cambridge in professional circles respecting a local examination held by that university.
