The Synod of the English Presbyterian Church decided by a vote of 155 to 6 to proceed to consummate the Union with the United Presbyterian Church. The Union will take place in 1874. A Memorial of £20,000 is to be raised in commemoration of the event.

The Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces, have devised a scheme for the Insurance of their church edifices, and call for applicants preparatory to putting it into operation.

WRECK OF THE DAYSRING.—We copy the following from the Witness of Saturday last:—Some portions of the New Hebrides were visited on the 6th of January with a severe and desolating storm, and its greatest strength and violence were experienced on the Island of Anceitum. We have descriptions of it from the pens of Rev. John Ingles, and Rev. John D. Murray, and both these show that nothing equal to it has occurred for many years.

It has left desolation in its track from the destruction of dwellings and fruit trees. The Dayspring was in port at Anceitum and though all preparation was made dragged her anchors and was dashed on a reef, becoming a total wreck. No life was lost, nor blame attached to captain, mate, or crew. She was insured in offices in Melbourne for the sum of £2000 stg., and Dr. McDonald, of Emerald Hill, Melbourne; writes that the insurance is safe, and will be paid over as soon as required.

A vessel will be chartered in Australia to take the place of the Dayspring in the meantime.

News of the Week.

THE BURIAL OF THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, THE HONORABLE JOSEPH HOWE, took place on Wednesday last. It had given to it somewhat of a public character by the Hon. W. J. Stairs and Colonel Laurie having been requested by the Government to conduct the arrangements of the procession, which comprised the Military, Naval, and the Halifax Militia Forces, with the Dominion, Provincial, County, and Civic authorities, the St. Georges, North British, and Irish Societies and Freemasons. They were arranged four abreast in the following order:

Warden and Councillors of Dartmouth. Officers of H. M. Navy. Officers of H. M. Army. Officers of H. M. Canadian Militia. Private Friends of Deceased. North British Society. Ch. Habile Irish Society. St. George's Society. Germania Society. Citizens. Freemasons. Carriages.

It was doubtless the most imposing funeral occasion that has ever been witnessed in the province.

The Streets through which the cortege passed—Pleasant, Morris, South Park, and Spring Garden Road—were lined by the men and marines from the Royal Alfred, the troops in garrison, and the City Militia. During the passage of the procession from Government House to the Cemetery minute guns were fired from the saluting battery at the Citadel, by the 2nd Brigade Garrison Artillery, and bells were tolled.

Flags had been at half-mast on public buildings and shipping from the time of Mr. Howe's death and from some private residences, but the number was much greater on the day of the funeral.

The sidewalks were filled with crowds of people to witness the procession. Their quiet, orderly demeanour indicated their sincere respect for the deceased, and sympathy with the bereaved friends.

The coffin was of polished walnut, appropriately mounted, and was profusely decorated with flowers. Some hours before the funeral Government House was opened to the public, and visitors permitted to take a last look upon the face of the deceased before the coffin was finally closed.

Large numbers had also previously been admitted to pay their respects by a visit to the room in which the body was lying. The religious services at the grave were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Smith, Pastor of Fort Massy (Presbyterian) Church. In many other parts of the province there were manifestations of respect on the day of the funeral. At Windsor blinds were drawn in the principal houses, business was suspended and flags were at half-mast.

A correspondent of the Chronicle has suggested the propriety of erecting, by public subscription a monument surmounted by a statue of Mr. Howe in the area of the Province Building. The idea has been spoken of favorably in several other papers since. There would doubtless be large numbers disposed to contribute to such an object if it were once started.

PETER McNAB, who was recently committed to prison for stabbing John Leadley has during the past week shown fresh indications of insanity. On Friday evening he attacked the turnkey of the jail. The jailer and two police constables happened to be near, heard the scuffle, ran to his relief, and found it as much as they could do to rescue the turnkey and put a straight jacket on McNab. When this had been done he continued to strike his head against the brick wall, and inflicted some injury on himself. He has since been taken to the Asylum for the Insane.

OUR NATAL DAY is to be kept on Monday the 23rd inst.—it appears, instead of Saturday the 21st, as it ought to be. This will give a better chance to rum-selling and rum-drinking, by removing the Sabbath barrier to the various spiritants of such occasions. We regret to see that Horse-racing on the Common is to be one part of the programme.

MORE COAL.—A shaft has been sunk on the coal seam being worked at Spring Hill, which is three-fourths of a mile from the main slope and within 150 yards of the branch railway. The seam is at this point nearly 11 feet thick, and from 17 to 18 feet from the surface. The coal proves of a very superior quality and harder than any previously raised. So important a discovery must enhance the value of the Spring Hill property. Works continue to progress favorably at the mine.—Amherst Gazette.

THE FUND for the relief of the sufferers at the Drummond Collieries has reached to about \$7000.

The driver of the mail near French River in Antigonish County, reports that he was attacked by some parties on the road, he supposed with a design of robbery, but that they were unsuccessful.

A large number of fishing schooners have been in our harbor during the past week, obtaining supplies before proceeding to the Labrador fisheries.

LARGE FIRES had been raging for several days last week, in various places in the counties of Yarmouth, Shelburne, and Queens.—Yarmouth papers report that on the "reserved land" between the Port Medway and Mersey rivers, in Queens, the timber has been completely destroyed, involving a loss of about \$200,000. We hope that the rains of the past few days stopped the progress of the destruction.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT BARRINGTON.—A very melancholy accident occurred in this vicinity last evening. Late in the afternoon Mr. Joseph Trefry went to his lobster nets which were set in the harbor. After tea his son went to relieve him when he could not be found. The alarm being given some men started in search and soon returned reporting that they had found his skull on Sheroff Island, and his hat floating upon the water. A short time after other parties returned from the search with the lifeless body which had come to the surface and was drifting toward the shore. His boat was a very low flat-bottomed punt, and it is supposed that he slipped out of her while hauling his nets. An inquest was held by Coroner Wilson and a verdict returned in accordance with the facts. Mr. Trefry was a member of the Free Baptist Church. He will be much missed in the community. He left a wife and two children who are nearly heart broken on account of their loss.—Com. by Rev. W. H. Richan.
