News of the Week.

THE ATLANTIC WRECK.—Every fine day we have accounts of goods and bodies being brought up from the sunken steamer. The divers obtained fifty-nine corpses of steerage passengers on Thursday last, most of them were sound and in a good state of preservation. As soon as recovered they are decently buried on the island. The valuables are taken possession of by the Customs Department, and lists published in the daily papers.

The subscriptions of Halifax citizens to procure a testimonial to be presented to Rev. Mr. Ancient for his bravery in rescuing one of the officers from the wreck has reached the sum of \$910.58.

The investigation closed on Friday. The Decision is published; from which we make some brief extracts. The Collector of Customs after a summing up of the facts concerning the steamer and the wreck, says:—

I believe the action of Captain Williams in bearing up for Halifax at 1 p. m. on the 31st March was prudent and justifiable, and also that his conduct and that of his officers, from the time that the ship struck, was marked by intrepidity and coolness, and desire to do everything in their power to save the lives of those who had been entrusted to their care. But I regret that I find it impossible to speak with approval of the management of the ship from the time her course was changed at 1 p. m. on Monday, until the time she became a wreck on the morning of Tuesday.

Whether or not sufficient allowance was made by Captain Williams for the current in the course that he steered, does not seem to be a question of vital importance. It seems to be impossible to account in any other way than by want of vigilance, for the fact of no lights being seen. It has been proved that Sambre Light, Chebucto Head and Devil's Island Lights were all in good order on that night. Sambre Light was distinctly visible from the Devil's Island Light, a distance of about 9 1/2 miles, at 3 o'clock, when the ship could not have been more than 7 or 8 miles distant from Sambre Light. The night seems to have been fine.

Had the very ordinary precaution been taken of sending a look-out at intervals to the mast-head, the disaster would in all human probability have been prevented. But the greatest, and I may say perhaps the fatal, error is found in the fact that the lead was never used, although the ship was in soundings for 8 hours before she struck. This is a neglect of duty for which there can be positively no excuse. So accurately are the soundings laid down upon the chart that had the lead been used at proper intervals the ship's safety would have been guaranteed, even had the night been one on which the light could not possibly have been seen.

From a careful review of all the facts of the case, I feel compelled to state my belief that the conduct of Capt. Williams in the management of the ship during the 12 or 14 hours preceding the disaster, was so gravely at variance with what ought to have been the conduct of a man placed in his responsible position, as to call for severe censure, and to justify me in saying that his certificate as extra master and master, might be cancelled. But in consideration of the praiseworthy and energetic effort made by him to save life after the ship struck, the mitigated penalty of suspension of certificate for two years should be imposed.

I also feel it my duty to state that the conduct of Mr. Brown, the 4th officer, in preventing the servant from calling Capt. Williams at 20 minutes to 3 as ordered was,

under the circumstances, an improper violation of the Capt's orders; and further, in the fact that, as one of the officers of the watch after 12 o'clock, he ought to have seen the light and did not see it, and ought to have seen the land and did not see it, there is an implied culpable neglect and want of vigilance which considerations for the public safety demand should be marked by censure and moderate punishment. I therefore adjudge, that the certificate of 4th officer Brown, as master, should be suspended for three months.

IMMIGRANTS.—A company of one hundred arrived in the mail steamer from England last week, en route for a new Danish settlement—Hellerup—in Victoria county, New Brunswick.

A SPLENDID NEW ORGAN for St. Pauls, church arrived from London on Thursday last. It is described as having 17 stops in all in the Great and Swell organ, besides the great open Diapason in the Pedal organ. In the "Great organ" there are 560 pipes; in the "Swell organ" there are 469 pipes, and in the "Pedal organ" 30 pipes. The speaking front pipes are of extra hard corrugated metal, richly decorated in gold and colour. The case is a very handsome one of pine, stained and varnished. The architecture is Grecian. The organist, Mr. S. Porter, arrived with the instrument and is to be choir-master as well.

HANTS COUNTY.—During the past few months the district of Maitland, has been scourged by scarlet fever and measles. Scarcely a family has escaped—in some instances just as they were recovering from one disease they would take the other. About seven per cent of the children under ten years have died from scarlet fever alone besides those from other diseases.

Senator Churchill has in his shipyard the frame of a new ship of 1009 tons which will be launched in the fall.

A cheese factory is to be established this summer at West River, Pictou County.

COLCHESTER CO.—A public meeting was held in Truro, on Tuesday the 15th, at which it was resolved to hold an Agricultural Exhibition in a central part of Colchester during this autumn. MAPLE SUGAR is pronounced less abundant than usual this year.

The M. A. Starr, was advertised to sail on Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock for Yarmouth and Western ports.

LOBSTER FACTORY AT DIGBY.—A gentleman from Halifax intends fitting up an establishment for canning lobsters, somewhere in the vicinity of Digby, most probably at Clementsport. The supply of lobsters is likely to be good, as soon as the fisherman are fitted up for them. There are plenty in the Basin every season.

THE RAILWAY TERMINUS.—The City Council has passed a resolution setting forth the great inconvenience arising from the present terminus being so far from the city, and expressing the opinion that it is the duty of the Government of Canada to at once proceed with the extension of the Railway to the city proper; and that it is the duty of the members representing the County of Halifax, to insist upon the immediate actual undertaking of the work.

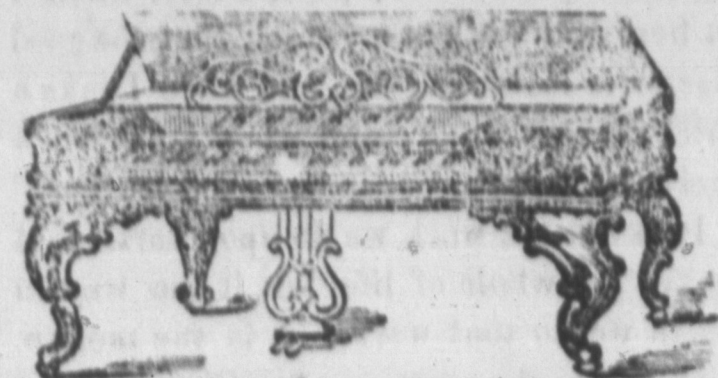
