The Church Chronicle of last week contains an Appeal from Bishop Binney to the members of the Church of England in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, for funds to build a Cathedral at Halifax. Judge Bliss has given a site, 150 feet by 250 feet deep, on the road towards the North West Arm. An offer is also made of £10 000, N. S. Currency on condition that £20,000 more be obtained, or subscriptions to that amount, before the end of 1873, towards which sum the bishop himself offers to give £1000 provided the balance be raised.

Our Church contemporary in an article on "Preaching" offers the opinion, or makes the acknowledgment, "that while those who differ from us exact (probably, exalt) this ordinance unduly, we, as members of the Church, are apt to think too lightly of it." He then ventures to affirm that "among the sects too much stress is laid upon what is termed good preaching, and no other qualifications will compensate in their opinion for the lack of pulpit unction, though such unction is frequently nothing more than mere flua readiness in Scriptural quotation."

This we presume is not intended as a compliment to " the sects." If however we may judge from the remainder of the article the writer would not object to some of his elergymen having a little more "fluency of speech. coupled at times with a readiness in Scriptural quotation."

He reproves "those who assemble in our own churches" for absenting themselves when "some one whom they do not affect is to preach, and who think it no harm to wander from the church to the meeting-house on such occasions, or where some new or popular preacher is advertized to officiate in the latter place." The remarks enjoining more attention to preaching on the clergy, and a greater readiness on the part of the people to receive the word preached by those appointed over them are doubtless not inappropriate to other bod es as well as churchmen.

It is unquestionably a defect in many congregations that they attach far more importance to the preaching than to the acts of worship in public. If a more hearty joining in the exercise of prayer and singing the praises of God, were to become general, and a more conscientions determination to be regularly and constantly present when the church assembles for worship the blessing would be evident and our profitting would appear to all.

The telegram from London on Monday gives us the information that the Hon, and Rev. Baptist Novl is dead. This distinguished man was formerly a clergyman of the Church of England and one of the Queen's Chaplains but becoming convinced of the error of Infant Baptism resigned his chaplaincy and his relationship to the Church of England and became the earnest and devoted pastor of the Baptist Church in John street, London, to which the Rev. J. H. Evans had for many years ministered. Mr. Noel has since been a leading man mall benevolent enterprizein connection with the Baptist body as well as in other denominations, and has been held in the highest estimation as well for his earnest, consistent piety as for his able and successful labors.

The news from England respecting the shipping prospects is good. A letter from a Liverpool correspondent received in St. John a few days since,

"Owing to the unprecedented severe losses of shipping this fall, prices have materially advanced, and good, serviceable ships, of all sizes, and about any age, are now worth fully a pound per ton more than they were two months ago. New eight year ships uncoppered would bring \$10 (sterling) per ton in the present condition of the market."
