LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND .- A strike of operatives has taken place at a flax mill at Belfast, Ireland. The striking work-people are making demonstrations. On Friday night crowds of men were parading the streets and attacked several bakeries The Magistrates asked for 400 additional policemen. The Committee of Agricultural Laborers Union in England have adopted a resolution declaring "as we are are not justified in appealing to the public for help for the locked out laborers in the Eastern Counties during harvest, therefore we offer them the alternative of emigration or depending on their own resources." The Committee is negotiating for easier terms of emigration to Canada.

The King of Ashantee has paid further instalments of \$60,000 to Great Britain. At Liverpool, the great Princess Dock mission and neglects to communicate with West. Colonel French, who has arrived, landing stages were entirely destroyed by fire on Tuesday. All ferry traffic between was temporarily suspended. The fire originated from the upsetting of a kettle of boiling tar Loss \$100,000.

In London, on Friday night, two policemen were horribly mutilated by a prisoner whom they were conducting to the station. The prisoner drew a large knife, stabbing them several times ; but they secured him.
