THE SNOW .- The past week has brought us a quantity of snow, sufficient to last us all the Winter, even if we do not get any more. The cold during the week since has been intense, reaching below zero nearly nearly every night, sometimes going down to 12° and 14° below.

The harbor was at first for several days during the intense cold covered with a dense fog, "the barber," until Saturday, when thin ice formed over its whole surface. In the afternoon of Sunday however it broke away at the narrows and was blown down, making it exceedingly difficult for the ferry boats to keep their regular trips. A north wind carried it down out of the way on Monday afternoon and the steamers have since continued to cross without interruption.

The road along westward was greatly impeded, so as to stop the traffic and the mails were detained several days. The violence of the storm does not appear to have reached far into the interior. The railway trains were from two to four hours behind time on Wednesday, but have since then been running pretty nearly on the usual time.
