HALIFAX, N. S., JUNE 24, 1874.

The National Division of the Sons of Temperance of America commenced its twenty-ninth annual Convention at Ottawa, on Wednesday last. The attendance was large and composed of delegates from all the Provinces of the Dominion and every State in the Union. Resolutions were unanimously carried, urging the necessity of prohibition of the liquor traffic as being the only means of success in grappling with intemperance.

P. E. ISLAND.-Rev. E. F. Foshay writes from Summerside to the Visitor. under date June 11, 1874 :---

MR. EDITOR,-Perhaps a few words about the work of grace in this place might be interesting to your readers. I came here about five weeks ago with the hope of improving my health and also of witnessing the triumphs of truth which I had learned were being manifested in this place.

At Summerside twenty-six have been baptized by Bro. Simpson. He came here the 29th of April for the purpose of resting, as he had been holding meetings incessantly at Shediac for about seven weeks. He found the church here holding special services with encouraging prospects, but without ministerial help. He was prevailed upon to spend a lew weeks with them. His labours were acceptable to the people generally, and have evidently been blessed of God in saving souls. The first Sabbath he baptized three, the second Sabbath two, the third Sabbath fourteen, and the fourth Sabbath seven. Others are enquiring the way to Zion. Bro. D. W. Crandal spent three week days and one Sabbath evening with Brother Simpson. He then went to Tryon, where his labours were blessed, and twenty-four were baptized by him, after which he came here, intending to go direct to St. John, but was advised to go to Cavendish, where my son was labouring, to assist him, which he did, and baptized four last Sabbath.
