The press generally approves of the President's veto, and there is a general feeling of relief at the apparently final disposition of the question.

The British steamer "Mississippi," from Liverpool to New Orleans, is ashore off Cape Florida.

The news from Arkansas tells of no more bloodshed since the skirmish of Tuesday. The Government troops still hold control of the situation. Baxter, with the approval of the President, has issued a proclamation calling an extraordinary meeting of the Legislature to settle the controversy.

In Boston, on Wednesday, Edward Pomeroy, aged fifteen, killed a four year old child, whom he entired to a lonely spot in the suburbs. He stabbed his victim eighteen times, and finished by cutting his throat. The young assassin was recently attack on Albanto. pardoned from the Reform School for cutting and mutilating several children younger than himself.

Despatches from London indicate a favorable effect of President Grant's veto upon United States interests abroad.

John Reeves, Chas, P. Smith, and three men named McKer, Hoffman, and Willatts, left Five Fathom Lightship on Wednesday, for Cape May, N. J. Their boat was swamped, and all were drowned, except Recves, who swam ashore.

Despatches from Louisiana represent that the whole courtry from Mubroe to the mouth of the Red River is now submerged, and that ten thousand people will soon be on the verge of starvation.

New Orleans is rapidly filling with reorde, to whom no employment can be given, and there is a great amount of suffering there. Governor Kellogg has issued a proclamation, giving assurance that every effort will be made to relieve the distressed, and committees are organizing to forward the work.

The overflow of the Mississippi and Arkansas rivers still continues, driving large numbers of people from their homes and causing great damage to property. It is stated 25,000 persons are in danger of THREE PLIES, Stout Scotch, and starvation A bill for their relief has passed Congress, and contributions are being raised for them at the north. The citizens of Boston have remitted \$10,000 for the sufferers.

Reports of a remarkable storm on Sunday last come from various parts of the New England and New York States. New Hampshire and Vermont, snow is reported to the depth of one foot; while in New York the storm was severer in that vicinity than any known for years. Considerable damage to shipping is reported.

Later reports from Louisiana state that the accessity for immediate relief is very urgent. The President has ordered 50,-000 rations to be sent.
