We must respect their native rulers, and govern the country through their influence as Ru-sia governs Central Asia through its Khans. Only it is to be quite clear that, like the Khans, the Ashantee rulers are to curry out aur wishes, and not their own. This, Sir. Bartle Frere thinks, is what we shall be compelled to do somer or later; so we had belter do it at once with a good grace But there are many difficulties in the way which Sir Bartle seems to overlook ; and i is certainly a melanel o y reflection that, in the mantime, we are undertaking military operations with the help of allies far more dispicable than the people against whom we are leading them. The Ashant e " customs " are, many of them, brutal enough; but our new friends would be capable of far worse, and will carry on their atrocious practices under the shelter of our flag and under the leadership of our officers.
