UNITED STATES.

SENATOR SUMNER died at Washington on Wednesday last. Funeral services commenced in the Senate Chamber on Friday last.

The Manufacturing company of Gloucester, N. Y. discharged seven hundred men on the 4th inst., who asked for higher wages.

During a hurricane at sea on the 27th ult., the steamer Pennsylvania, from Liverpool for Philadelphia, was injured and four lives lost.

A Central Pacific Railway train has been wrecked near Wells and many persons killed.

The Erie Railway Company is to proceed in the spring with the erection of a new suspension bridge over the Niagara river.

A summary of the temperance movement in sixty Ohio towns and villages shows that in eleven towns liquor selling has entirely stopped.

MEXICO.—A stage coach was attacked by bandits in Mexico recently, and the passengers resisting a fight occurred in which two persons were killed.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—The Duke of Edinburgh and bride made their entry into London on Thursday last. Snow fell from the beginning to the end of the ceremonies.

The members of the late Cabinet held a meeting on Wednesday last, at which they agreed to accept the temporary leadership of the Marquis of Hartington.

Mr. Gladstone will resume the leadership of the party in 1875. The Times says: "So long as Gladstone remains in the House of Commons, he is the only possible leader of the Liberal party."

The Daily News says: "Gladstone's name is a tower of strength. The whole body of Liberals regard him as their natural head; any other person would only be the leader of a section."

Mr. Disraeli has issued his address to his constituents, asking once more for their suffrages. He promises to uphold the institutions, and defend the rights of all classes.

It is estimated that the Queen may open Parliament in person on the 29th inst., in which case there will be a grand display.

On Thursday last the Caledonian Railway was blocked by snow, several trains being buried in the drifts.

Imperialists from all parts of France arrived in London last week, to attend the festivities at Chiselhurst on the occasion of Prince Louis Napoleon attaining his majority.

A Jute spinning mill, at Dundee, was burned last week. Loss \$1,600,000. Seven hundred hands were thrown out of employment.

Charles Orton has made a confession, published in the London Globe, that "The claimant is his own brother."

He has confessed that he was bribed to keep silence in regard to his professed relationship to the Tichborne claimant.

The "Daily News" and "Telegraph" announce that the King of Ashantee agrees to pay 50,000 ounces of gold; renounce all claims to Adansi, Assin, Denkira, Akins and Wassin; withdraws his forces from all parts of the coast belonging to or under the Protectorate of Great Britain.

Gen. Wolseley does not expect that the entire amount of the indemnity will ever be paid, but regards the other stipulations of vastly greater importance and more likely to be adhered to.

The war is considered at an end, and the Ashantee kingdom hopelessly disrupted.

FRANCE.—In the Assembly a petition has been presented charging Gambetta with having sacrificed the nation and its defence to his political designs.

A proposition has been made in the French Assembly to disfranchise the French Colonies; but was opposed by Laboulaye.

SPAIN.—Gen. Meruzas has resigned his command in the army of the North in consequence of illness. Marshal Sarrano has assumed the command.

ITALY.—The Pope has written to the Austrian Bishops, inciting them to use all their influence to prevent the passage of the proposed ecclesiastical laws.

GERMANY.—Bismark is suffering from gout.

CUBA.—Arrests of Cubans, who resist the draft continue to be numerous in the interior of the Island.
