The fact that a daughter of Baron Rother child, of Paris, has passed a successful examination as teacher, so that in case of any sudden reverse of fortune-which, by the way, is rather improbable-she may earn her livelihood, should induce other daughters to follow a similar course of training. and render themselves useful, as well as ornamental, members of society.

A missionary in Western Turkey writes that five times as many persons have become Protestants within the last two years as in twelve years preceding, and more than two-thirds of these within the past nine months. More Bibles and religious books have been sold the last winter than ever before, and the three week day prayermeetings and the Sabbath services have never been attended so well.

Great sensation has been caused at Rome in Roman Catholic circles by the conversion to Protestantism of another distingushed clergyman of the church. The name of the convert is Alceste Lamna. He was a parish priest, a Doctor of Divinity, and has been professor of philosophy at the Vatican Seminary, and teacher of mathematics at a polytechnic school.

A remarkable religious awakening is reported in North China. Two years ago Cheefoo, a Buddhist, happening to enter a Christian church became a convert to Christianity, and immediately went to labor among the people of his native town to induce them to embrace the same religion. Thus far there have been 160 converts. The place of the revivals is 200 miles distant from the residence of any missionary, and outside of the ordinary lines of travel.

MR. SPERGEON ON THE PLYMOUTH BRETH-REN .- We have all suffered from these Plymouths, who are "contrary unto all men," at least, some sorts of them, for like Jeremiah's figs, they are not all alike. Of all men the most sugarified and dearing to begin with, and the most cantankerous in the long run, they are the Ishmaelites of the religious world, neither at peace with themselves nor others. No people began with higher aims or nobler prospects, but none have failed so egregiously. Incidental good has come from their uprising, but they themselves have missed the mark they are the body who, above all others. have preached unity, and exhibited to the world a spectacle of disunion, bickerings. and schism among themselves, and of unparalleled bitterness and bigotry towards other bodies of believers .- Sword and Trowel for August.

" CHRISTENING " FESTIVITIES IN SCOTLAND -At the police court of Greenock, the other day, in connection with an assault case, the presiding magistrate - Bailie Campbell-referred to the drinking customs common at " christenings," and expressed a wish to see these customs put a stop to. He said that drinking was once largely indulged in at funerale, but that had now happily almost entirely ceased. If the clergy and others who have influence would more strongly discountenance the pernicious custom of drinking infants' healths at "christenings," he thought an improvement would soon be effected. In the case before him the parties had assembled to witness a solemn religious ceremony, and by partaking of liquor they had been guilty of conduct that was a disgrace to religion; and a most unseemly assault had been committed.

"HEATHEN" AND "CHRISTIAN" STREETS. -Rev. Dr. Punshon, in a recent address, described an Indian village which he had seen on Vancouver's Island. " There were two streets called ' Heathen' and ' Christian.' The Heathen street was close to

the river, and consisted of a long row of shantees, with a door, indeed, and a chimney to each, but no windows. The door and the chimney formed the only orifices. Here five, six, sometimes ten families berded together. In 'Christian' street one saw white cottages, in which the institution of the family appeared, with something of the industries of civilized life, and giving one the idea of a home. Old fathers of sixty years of age were in ' Heathen' street, but their sons were in · Christian ' street; and as the Gospel continues to be preached, there is a little emigration going on by persons passing from the former to the latter."

Intense cold prevailed at the Cape up to the last week in July. Operations at the diamond fields were interrupted in consequence, and great depression prevailed. A violent storm on the east coast on the 18th and 19th caused the wreck of several vessels. Deaths had occurred in the eastern provinces from exposure to the cold.

Dominion & Foreign Arws.

HALIFAX, N. S., OCTOBER 21, 1874.

A. Emanuel & Co., of Montreal, the largest importers of cigars in the Dominion, have suspended, with liabilities of four bundred thousand dollars.

The work on the Victoria Railway has of Wales. begun in good earnest. Three hundred Icelanders, recently arrived, have gone to work on the line.

The Court of Queen's Bench, at Fort Garry, Manitoba, has passed sentence of outlawry against Louis Riel This action disposes of the question whether Riel is or is not a fugitive from justice, and of any claim to sit unmolested in Parliament.

The trial of Lepine, being accessory to the murder of Thomas Scott during the insurrection in the North West, has commenced at Fort Garry, Manitoba.

The Quebec Board of Trade has adopted a resolution declaring the proposed Reciprocity Treaty unfavorable to Canada, especially in the sliding scale of duties, in the refueal of the American Ocean coasting trade and in the operous canal obligations. Also on the ground that there is no equivalent for the valuable Canadian Fisheries.

A diabolical attempt was made to fire the Government Emigrant Shed at Quebec, Had it not been discovered several persons must have been burned to death,

Owing to the action of Local Government the Dominion has been unable to obtain, possession of the P. E. Island Railway, and opening this winter is consequently problematical.

A fire at Montreal on Monday damaged the stores of McArthur & Sons W. McGill to the amount of \$200,000.

UNITED STATES.

The increase of diptherm in New York last week has been alarming, and number of cases make disease almost epidemic. The fatality is great.

The steam-tug Topham exploded her boiler near Bath, Me., killing fireman, and scalding cook, probably fatally.

The Excelsior Fine Salt Mill in Syracuse, New York, was burned last week, causing a total loss, with the salt destroyed, o \$85,000.

Sir Edward Thornton, the British Minis-

ter, arrived in New York from Liverpool. The Democratic State ticket was elected in Arkansas by 75,000 majority, and the new Constitution was carried.

The Democratic majority in Ohio will be about 20,000.

The Southern Republican Convention assembles at Chattanooga on the 15th.

There was a fight in St. James' Parish, Louisiana, between the hands of two factories, in which several were wounded.

Hopes of a compromise between the whites and Kellogg's party, are about abandoned, and further bloodshed is feared before the election.

In a fight between seven whites proceeding to Black Hills tor gold, and Indians, from prison to a hospital of charity in two of the former were killed and two wounded. It is believed the Indians' loss is ten killed.

The Sioux Indians declare that they will defend their reservations with their lives.

On the Baltimore railroad on Sanday last an express train was wrecked, but the lives of all the passengers were saved by the boldness of the engineer and fireman who were killed at their posts, though they might have saved themselves by deserting the train.

The result of the elections for Councils General in France, is the election of 670 Republicans, 604 Monarchists and 155 Bonapartists.

French war steamer Orenoque, recalled from Civita Vechia to Toulon, but it implies no change in the relations of France to the Pope, as another vessel will be placed at his disposal

SPAIN.—The Republican Army defeated 4,000 Carlists with heavy loss at Orioga di Navarre, on the 9th inst.

The Spanish Minister at Berl n presented the German Government with a copy of Spain's protest to France.

It is reported that General Dorregary, with 800 Carlist troops, has gone over to the Republican army, and that several Carlist battations have surrendered at Algosta.
