THE PROVINCIAL AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION is now in full operation. DARTMOUTH—A new steamer is being built by Mr. Mosely intended as an excursion and tug boat. She is to be 120 feet in length; breadth of beam, 19 feet; depth of hold, 7 ft. 3 inches; burthen in tons, 135. She is to have two Glasgow-built engines, combined 140 horse power.
