LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND .- On Friday morning a barge lying in Regent's Canal, near the Zoological Gardens, with four tons of gunpowder on board, exploded with terrific force. Several persons were killed and many hurt .-Bridges and houses in the vicinity were shattered.

The explosion was heard 20 miles. Firemen dragging the Canal found 5 bodies. Lights two miles away were extinguished by the concussion. A number of animals in the Zoological Gardens were killed. Muny trees were uprooted. A house 2 miles distant was shattered. Several persons died

from fright. Great Britain Las joined the postal

Steamship "Faraday," had laid 1500 miles of cable, when it broke during gale in 2500 fathome, lon. 24 of W. Buoys are placed to mark the position. The "Faraday," after taking provisions and coal, will attempt to recover the lost cable, of which 600 knots have been laid.

The Mark lane Express in its review of the crop prospects, says "Recent rains have materially benefitted root crops. There has been too much rain, however, for late potatoes, which have shown the commencement of disease. The wheat trade shows neither encouraging nor discouraging features. Prices in France are a shilling lower, but elsewhere on the Continent they are unchanged, except at Odessa, where prices are firmer in the hope that fine quality crops will eventually secure better prices.

The Spanish steamer "Juan," now at Sligo, has been detained by the authorities. She has 13 Armstrong guns on board, which are supposed to have been for the Carlists. The Captain declares that the gubs are the property of the Spanish Government, and he is taking them to England for repairs.

No tea vessels were damaged by the typhoon, but the Pacific mail steamer "Alaska" was driven fast upon the rocks. Her crew were saved.

The German Government intend establishing a naval hospital at Yokahama. Ten thousand Chinese troops are en route to Formoen. War between China and Japan seems inevitable.


