A LEARNED NEGRO. - Prof. E. W. Blyden, of Liberia, on whom Lincoln University has just conferred the degree of L L D., is probably the most learned person of African blood living, especially in linguistical literature, the Latin, Greek, Hebrew, Arabic, and Semitic tongues generally.
