Parliamentary.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

On MONDAY, M. B. Desbrisay, Esq., presented the report of his Immigration Agency.

On TUESDAY, Mr. Taylor introduced a bill to incorporate the Provincial Orange Lodges of N. S.

The House in Committee on bills passed one to allow pay to the Board of Works; one to incorporate the Christian Brothers; and one to appoint an Auditor for Halifax city. A bill to fund the debt of Halifax was introduced by Mr. Flinn.

On WEDNESDAY, the Dominion Tariff was brought to the notice of the House by Mr. Blanchard. He regarded the changes made in the duties as unfair to Nova Scotia and calculated to seriously interfere with her industries. He thought it right that a remonstrance should go from the local parliament, and moved the following:

Resolved, That this House does most emphatically remonstrate against the proposed change of the tariff as unjust and oppressive to the Maritime Provinces, on whom the burden will principally fall.

Resolved, That a copy of the above resolution be at once forwarded by telegraph to the members for Nova Scotia now at Ottawa, with a request that they shall unitedly oppose the change.

Hon. Provincial Secretary was glad to hear what had been brought before the house. It fully confirmed his anticipations but thought the local legislature had no right to interfere in the matter. He was not prepared to say that Nova Scotia had been unjustly dealt with but thought the representatives at Ottawa would attend to our interests in that respect.

Mr. Morrison said he was not prepared to justify the changes in the tariff but supposed the Ottawa Government had good reasons for doing as they had done.

Mr. Holmes believed the effect of the change would be to depress our trade and commerce.

Mr. Rennie spoke specially of the injury done to our ship building interests.

Mr. Smith thought the exigencies of the case demanded the duties that were imposed and he accepted the situation.

Hon. Attorney General believed that the House should not interfere. Mr. Woodworth spoke briefly, after which the debate was adjourned. THURSDAY was occupied largely by the debate on the Tariff resolutions. Mr. Morrison moved in amendment that it was inexpedient for the House to interfere in a matter, which belonged entirely to the Dominion Parliament. After speeches by Messrs. Smith, Vail, and Landers, in favor of the amendment, and Messrs. Blanchard,

Vickery, Rettie, and Woodworth, in favor of the original resolution, the debate was adjourned.

Mr. Woodworth asked for the production of certain books and papers from the Crown Lands office, and made a charge against the Provincial Secretary of his having falsified the Records of that office in 1871, for the purpose of concealing the unlawful grants of lands in the county of Guysboro. Mr. Vail denied the charge. The books were brought and a Committee of three Messrs. Archibald, Johnson, and Holmes, appointed to examine said books.

On FRIDAY after several bills had passed the third reading, Mr. Holmes asked the Government to lay on the table all the correspondence respecting the Antigonish Riot.

Mr. Freeman moved for the second reading of the bill on Temperance which passed.

Dr. Cameron renewed the debate on the Tariff resolutions, and showed that the debt of Canada had not increased. He attributed the deficiency entirely to the taking off the duty from Tea and Coffee, and that it was therefore clear there had been no extravagance on the part of the past government.

Messrs. Rettie, Dr. Campbell, McKay, Blanchard, Holmes, and Woodworth spoke in favor of the resolutions; Messrs. Gayton, Smith, Attorney General, and Provincial Secretary in favor of the amendment.

On SATURDAY besides the passing of several bills, and sending them to the Legislative Council, some conversation arose on the franking privilege.

Hon. Commissioner of Mines explained that in his office they never franked.

The Prov. Sec said he used that privilege when he thought proper, and at other times he used postage stamps.

Mr. Woodworth said that the House had given each member \$20 for postage stamps in lieu of the privilege, the Government ought not to use the privilege.

The House in committee then passed several Bills.
