HALIFAX, April 13th, 1874. To the Insured and intending Insurers

GENTLEMEN .- An attempt has been made by parties in this Province, to weaken confidence in American Life Insurance Companies by stating that in case of war between Great Britain and the United States, Dominion policy holders in American Companies have no security. I have he-itated to reply, from the supposition that none could be prejudiced by such unscrupulous statements. They argue such would be the result from a decision rendered by Judge Emmons of Tennessee, in favor of the New York Life Assurance Company which was sued for the amount of a policy issued by one of its Southern agencies previous to the late civil war. They evidently forgot to state that un opposite decision has been rendered frequently since the war, and that the question is now before the United States Supreme Court for final decision. Whatever this decision may be, it cannot, in the remotest degree, affect the security of policies hald by Canadians in American Companies in case of international hestilities.

War between Great Britain and the JAPANESE COLONG, United States is a very remote probability, so remote that I apprehend but few would hesitate to insure in an American company, even though in case of war their policies would become void. But gentlemen, this would not be the case. Permit me to direct your attention to the Treaty of Commerce, &c., between Great Britain and the United States, ratified June 24, 1795:

Art. 10. "Neither the debts due from individuals of the one nation to individuals of the other, nor shares nor monies which they may have in the public funds, or in the public or private banks, shall ever in any event of war or national differences, be sequestered or confiscated, it being unjust and impolitie that debts and ENGAGEMENTS contracted and made by individuals having confidence in each other, and in their respective governments, should ever be destroyed or impaired by national authority on account of national differences and discontents."

This article, which was made permanent, covers every legitimate financial transaction or engagement that can possibly be entered into between the inhabitants of the two nationalities.
