NEW BRUNSWICK.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT-REV. PETER KEAY KILLED .- The Rev. Mr. Keay, Presbyterian minister, stationed at St. Andrews was in 11 health and being advised to travel came to St. John towards the end of last week, and was the guest of the Rev. Mr. Cameron. On Saturday he went to Fredericton. He left Fredericton on Monday morning to return home, and was detained some time at McAdam Junction awaiting the arrival of the train from Bangor. One account states that as this train approached Rev. Mr. Keay, who was standing on or near the track in attempting to get out of the way, slipped and fell before the train. Another account is that the St. Andrews train, which leaves the station after the arrival of the Bangor train, started sooner than Mr. Keay expected, and that, attempting to get on while the train was in motion, he fell, and the two last cars passed over him. His head was severed from the body. The news of this dreadful accident created no little sensation last evening in the city. where the Rev. gentleman was known and esteemed .- Freeman.

in eight fathoms of water and her topmasts remained above the surface. The " Ossipee " then resumed her voyage.

The sinking of the "Virginius" has caused a stoppage of the proceedings against the vessel at Havana. The papers are bitter over the result, charging the Government with bad faith and denouncing them in round terms.

The United States Government has ordered a rigid enquiry into the circumstances connected with the sinking of the " Virginius."

A vendetta between United States Citizens and Mexicans in Linceln County, New Mexico, ended on Saturday the 27th in a bloody fight, several men and one woman being killed.

The Railway Depot at Portland has for some time been accouncilating freight because vessels could not be obtained to take it to Liverpool. There is said to be 1000 car loads now waiting for shipment, enough to load ten large steamers.


