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Many intelligent readers among us have the idea that the funds for the support of the religious and educational work of the Church of England come chiefly from the public treasury. the voluntary gifts of private individon this point have recently been published. The Church Building Society, a voluntary organization, during the years between 1861 and 1870 erected 1110 churches; and nearly all this was accomplished by voluntary contributions. Private benefactions for church-building, under the Ecclesiastic Commission have amounted to more than \$8,000,000. Nearly one million of dollars has been contibuted within the last few years for building schools for the middle classes, under the control of the Church of England. And within a few years some two millions have been expended by voluntary gift for the restoration of Cathedrals. The actual advance, it will be seen, is largely owing to the benevolence and public spirit of individuals. This will be found to be the case in most instances of vigorous and continued growth. The days are past when sovereigns and irresponsible governments could use the money of the people for such works as might gratify their own tastes and promote their own glory. The money for such works must now be the direct gift of the people; they will give it just so soon as they are instructed to see that such expenditures are for the highest welfare of the

Such statements show that the arguments which are used to make evident the duty to support schools for elementary education with public money, lose much of their force when applied to institutions for the higher grades of education.
